What's Cooking?

Strawberry Pretzel Jello Salad

3 tbsp. sugar 2 c. crushed pretzels 1/4 c. melted butter 1/2 c. powdered sugar 10 oz. pkg. frozen strawberries 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese 8 oz. carton dessert topping 2 c. miniature marshmallows 6 oz. pkg. strawberry gelatin 2 1/2 c. boiling water

Mix together sugar, melted butter and crushed pretzel sticks. Press into 9 x 13 pan and bake 15 minutes at 350 degrees. Set aside to cool. Soften cream cheese; add powdered sugar and cream well. Fold in dessert topping and marshmallows. Spread over pretzel crust. Mix gelatin in boiling water, including juice from strawberries. Stir in strawberries. When slightly thickened, pour over cream cheese layer. Place in the refrigerator until set. Serves 8 to 10.

Extreme Wildfire Danger:

DON'T DRIVE INTO SMOKE ON THE ROAD - Wind driven wildfire can move as fast as 60 miles per hour. When you see thick smoke across a highway, do not drive into it. Slow down. Prepare to stop and turn around. Activate your emergency flashers to warn vehicles following you. Check for oncoming traffic. Make sure you can turn around safely. Remember, when there is dense smoke on the road, do not drive into it.

STAY ALERT TO WILDFIRE DANGER WHEN TRAVELING - Texans face extreme wildfire danger. Check fire and weather conditions before you get on the road. Monitor radio broadcasts while traveling. In areas where there may be wildfire, watch for highway signs, traffic control personnel and fire fighters. Slow down and prepare to stop when they signal you to do so. Remember, wind driven wildfire can move as fast as 60 miles per hour. If you see dense smoke on the road, do not drive into it.

WILDFIRES AND EVACUATIONS - Texans face extreme wildfire danger. When you are told to evacuate - do so immediately. As you evacuate, be alert to the changes in the speed and direction of fire and smoke. Wind driven wildfire can move as fast as 60 miles per hour. If there is a wildfire in your area - and you have time to prepare - shut gas off at the meter and turn off propane tanks. Wet down your roof and shrubbery within 15 feet of your residence. Choose a route that leads away from the fire. Park your vehicle facing in the direction of escape. Remember, wildfires can travel at great speed. When told to evacuate - do so immediately.

WILDFIRE DANGER AND OUTDOOR ACTIVITIES - Texans face extreme wildfire danger. Be cautious about outdoor activities that might cause sparks or fires. Sparks can easily escape from burning trash. Avoid using welding or grinding equipment near dry weeds and grass. Avoid parking vehicles in tall, dry grass and weeds. Weeds and grass could be ignited by hot catalytic converters. Crush cigarettes in an ashtray and make sure they are really out.

Recycling at Earth Day

Recycling efforts abound at Earth Day Texoma, April 16. The parking lot on the south side of Sherman City Hall (northeast corner of Pecan at South Elm Streets) will be the site for multiple recycling opportunities.

Paper files will be shredded and reused. The computers and inkjets used to generate the files will be recycled and kept out of landfills. Baseball caps and blood will be recycled too at Earth Day, one of the biggest festivals in Texoma.

Everyone has a baseball cap stuffed in the back of the closet. Most of us have several that we're never going to use. Red River Unitarian Universalist Church is collecting caps for field workers south of the border. "Workers in Central American need your help to save their eyes," said Suzanne Durland who is coordinating the effort.

"I will have two locations for people to deposit their caps," she said. "Sunglasses are welcome as well." Caps and sunglasses will be collected from 10 am to 4 pm.

A paper shredding truck, courtesy of Wells Fargo Advisors, will be parked in the south parking lot of the Sherman city building. Cars and trucks (no trailers please) will be allowed to drive through to unload paper and documents for shredding from 10 am to 4 pm.

Visitors can park and watch their documents being shredded on camera if they desire. The paper recycling truck will also be able to accept paper that is already shredded for recycling. It is not necessary to remove staples and paper clips. This is a secure and environmental way to dispose of documents.

EWaste Disposal (EWD) will be providing recycling at the Texoma Earth Day. Joan Meeks, coordinator for EWD, said EWaste are items that have reached their end of usage cycle. "Please don't dispose of these items in the trash," Meeks said. "EWaste contaminates our landfills with their toxicity." Bring your items to Texoma's Earth Day instead.

EWaste are items that operate on electricity: refrigerators, car batteries, VCR tapes, electronics, printers, computers, TVs, DVDs, cameras, coffee pots, blow dryers, paper shredders and more. Items will be recycled free with the exception of TVs (\$15), CRTs (\$7), and Freon items (\$35). "A certified Hard Drive swipe can be done for \$15," Meeks said.

Rapid Refill Ink has been a sponsor of Earth Day for several years. Owners Bill and Trudy Whitney have added the service of recycling printer ink cartridges and toner cartridges to their support of the festival.

"Drum units and retired printers can also be recycled," Trudy said. Many of the products collected will be sent to an electronics recycler. Some of the more common inkjets will be remanufactured at Rapid Refill.

"We will offer a \$3 coupon valid for purchase of a remanufactured or refilled Rapid Refill Ink product when a visitor brings empty cartridges that can be reused in our store," Trudy said. Toners and printers will be recycled free of charge."

The Sherman Noon Lions Club will have members on site to collect eyeglasses donations as well.

Blood can be donated in the Municipal Ballroom from 10 am to 4 pm on April 16 as well. The Bloodmobile will be at an alternate location that day but workers will be in hand to accept donations for the needy in a clean area.

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April 14 **Preserving Forest History** By Bob Bowman

There's a new look these days at one of East Texas' most unusual museums.

The Texas Forestry Museum, built in 1976 to preserve the history and heritage of the forests and forest products industry, recently underwent an extensive renovation at Lufkin.

As a result, the museum offers visitors new perspectives of Texas' earliest industry, sawmilling, and one of its newest, the manufacture of paper.

Texas' first sawmill was built in the 1820s near Harrisburg by the Harris and Wilson families and was destroyed by Santa Anna in 1836 a few days before he was defeated at San Jacinto by Texas revolutionaries.

While the manufacture of paper in Texas began with a few modest efforts in the 1890s, it wasn't until 1940 that the first paper mill, a

Currently, Title 8 of the U.S. Code fills in the gaps left by the Constitution. Section 1401 defines the following as people who are "citizens of the United States at birth:"

Anyone born inside the United States * editorial note (That has included Hawaii for most of my 75 years)

Any Indian or Eskimo born in the United States, provided being a citizen of the U.S. does not impair the person's status as a citizen of the tribe

Any one born outside the United States, both of whose parents are citizens of the U.S., as long as one parent has lived in the U.S.

Any one born outside the United States, if one parent is a citizen and lived in the U.S. for at least one year and the other parent is a U.S. national

Any one born in a U.S. possession, if one parent is a citizen and lived in the U.S. for at least one year

Any one found in the U.S. under the age of five, whose parentage cannot be determined, as long as proof of noncitizenship is not provided by age 21

Any one born outside the United States, if one parent is an alien and as long as the other parent is a citizen of the U.S. who lived in the U.S. for at least five years (with military and diplomatic service included in this time)

A final, historical condition: a person born before 5/24/1934 of an alien father and a U.S. citizen mother who has lived in the U.S.

* There is an exception in the law — the person must be "subject to the jurisdiction" of the United States. This would exempt the child of a diplomat, for example, from this provision.

Anyone falling into these categories is considered naturalborn, and is eligible to run for President or Vice President.

Now, this is the important question:

newsprint manufacturer, was built in the heartland of the pine forests.

The success of Southland Paper Mills of Lufkin paved the way for the construction of other mills in Texas and the South.

While the Museum has hundreds of items on display, it is also responsible for some of the largest museum exhibits in Texas, including:

*A full-sized lookout tower used by firefighters to spot forest forests. It is one of the last such towers left in Texas.

*A complete logging train, including a locomotive, steam log loader, a log car, and a caboose.

*A railroad depot once used at Camden, a pioneering sawmill town in Polk County.

*A twenty-ton working steam engine once used to power sawmill machine.

*A high-wheel logging cart, one of the last left in Texas.

The Museum itself has an interesting history. The original concept was offered in 1957 by A.W. Nelson, Jr. of Champion Paper and Fiber Company and became a formal project of the Texas Forestry Association a year later.

The association's members, prodded by TFA executive secretary Ed Waggoner of Lufkin, began collecting items and assembled most of them at Stephen F. Austin State College in Nacogdoches. The items were displayed by the college's School of Forestry and a museum building was proposed, but was never built in Nacogdoches.

An offer by SFA president Ralph Steen to provide land for the museum near the historic Old Stone Fort on the college campus was considered, but shelved when the Forestry Association started work on a new building at Lufkin.

In 1975, Melvin E. Kurth, Jr., chaired a fund-raising drive for the Museum at Lufkin.

John Fleming of Independence, Missouri, holds a special place in the history of the museum. In May 1978 he was the 5,000th person to visit the museum.

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Free Medicare Preventive Care Has Kicked In

One of the benefits of the health reform law took effect January 1, 2011: free preventive services for Medicare recipients. Under the law, people with regular Medicare will no longer have to pay a co-pay, coinsurance or deductible to receive preventive services that are highly recommended by the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force -- services that include screenings for breast cancer, colon cancer, diabetes and heart disease, as well as smoking cessation counseling. Private Medicare plans (also known as Medicare Advantage plans) may still charge for these services, but many do not.

Also under the health reform law, Medicare Part B beneficiaries will now receive an annual wellness visit free of charge. During this yearly visit, your doctor or other health practitioner recognized by Medicare (such as a nurse practitioner) will update your medical history and current prescriptions; measure your height, weight, blood pressure and body mass index; create a screening schedule for

the next 5 to 10 years and screen for cognitive issues. And Medicare now pays in full, without patient co-pays or deductibles, for the initial "Welcome to Medicare" that Medicare has offered since 2005 to beneficiaries within 12 months of their becoming covered under Medicare Part B.

"Preventing diseases that can be prevented, and detecting others at earlier, more treatable stages, are among the keystones for transforming Medicare," said Jonathan Blum, deputy administrator and director of the Center for Medicare at the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services.

"By eliminating the beneficiary's out-ofpocket costs for most preventive services, we are removing a barrier to access and paving the way for improved health for seniors and people with disabilities who rely on Medicare for their health coverage."

Sunset Bills

Agencies come up for review before the legislature at least every twelve years, in a process that is commonly referred to as "sunset." The reviews of agencies are staggered, so that an average of 25 agencies come up for review in any given session. This session there are 28 agencies up for review, including the Department of Transportation, the Department of Insurance, the Commission on Environmental Quality, and the Public Utility Commission. This week, the House heard the first two sunset bills of the session.

The Sunset Commission holds hearings during the interim regarding proposed changes to state agencies up for review. The Commission then issues reports to the legislature with the commission's recommendations. Members who sit on the Sunset Commission author the bills that may include, but are not limited to, the Commission's recommendations. Most importantly, a sunset bill must pass in order for an agency that is under review to continue to exist. Sunset legislation is a priority in every session.

This week, the House heard H.B. 1808, which was the sunset bill for the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. The board was created by the Legislature to work directly with owners and operators of agricultural land to develop and implement conservation plans involving land treatment measures for erosion control, water quantity, and water quality purposes. H.B. 1808 provides for the continuation of the agency and several statutory modifications to provide processes and systems to ensure that agency programs are effective and accountable.

The House also debated H.B. 2271, which is the sunset bill for the Texas Racing Commission and also the Equine Research Account Advisory Committee. In 1986, the Legislature created the Texas Racing Commission to oversee the racing industry. The Commission is charged with licensing racetracks and their employees, overseeing live racing events, and monitoring and certifying wagering transactions. H.B. 2271 provides for the continuation of the agency for six years and makes some changes to the agency's regulatory abilities. Also in H.B. 2271 is the provision that abolishes the 11-member Equine Research Account Advisory Committee. This committee was charged with recommending funding for equine research projects; however, it failed to provide clear results, and therefore was abolished.

Missing The Mark

The Greek word hamartia is translated as sin in the New Testament. In classical Greek, it means to "miss the mark" or to "miss the target" as in archery. In the Hebrew, "hatta'â" is translated, "a falling away from or missing the right path." One of Webster's definitions of "target" is "a mark, a line, or a boundary."

"marks" (Ten Commandments) to live within (Exodus 20:3-17).

Neighborhood Genealogist – Getting more Information

In our first article I showed you how to fill out two of the basic information sheets that are used in recording your ancestry. I hope you filled out pages for everyone that you have information on because that is the best way to start. Later we will talk about putting that information on a computer program.

Now I will give you some ideas about finding more information. Look over the sheets you already have, and notice the areas that are missing information. Now look and see who on those sheets will know that information that you are missing. Think about it. We are talking about your parents, grandparents, great-grandparents, aunts, uncles, cousins, and others who are still living and may be able to answer your questions.

Make plans to visit these folks. I suggest you take What were his hobbies? a tape recorder and plenty of note paper. Also be What was your father's prepared with the questions you need answered. How many siblings do y

There are two types of questions you want to ask. First is the specific question that you needed answered. "When was Aunt Judy Born? Where was Aunt Judy Born? What was Aunt Judy's maiden name?" You may have a lot of these so be ready to get the answers. These questions usually have very short answers.

Next you will want to ask a lot of open ended questions. These are questions that my have very long answers. This is where you will want to have your tape recorder going. Once your "Grandma" starts on the answer, do not stop her. Let her keep going with her story. You will often get a lot of information that you never expected. This is the time that you will want to carefully listen to what she says and not be distracted by writing it all down. You will hear things that give you other questions to ask. These interviews are priceless and someday day you will be glad you have them recorded.

Here are some of the open ended questions that will start such a conversation:

Where did you grow up? What were your parents like? Your siblings? What do you remember about your grandparents? Who were your friends? What was school like for you?

What did you do for fun when you were a child? when you were a teenager? What movies and songs did you like when you were young? How did you meet your spouse? What important lessons have you learned in your life? When and where were you born? How did you get your name? What did you look like as a baby? What color are your eyes? What color is your hair? What are your earliest memories? Who is your mother? Describe her appearance and personality. Did your mother work outside the home? What did she do? Who is your father? Describe him and his personality. Did your father do home repairs? What was your father's occupation? How many siblings do you have? What are their names? Where do you fit in the family? What family rules did you have? What did your parents value? Did you have assignments or chores when you were a child? Did you get along well with your siblings when you were children? Do you get along well with your siblings now? Did you know your grandparents? What were they like? Did you know any of your great-grandparents? Tell about them. Who were your earliest friends? Where did you play? What kinds of games did you play?"

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Well you can see that these I much information to be gathered by these interviews. I have a six page list that I give to my classes when I teach beginning genealogy. I am sending that list to your newspaper and if you want a copy, contact them. How Long Was Jesus in the Grave?

For centuries, Christians have observed the crucifixion of Jesus as being on Friday afternoon and the resurrection at dawn the following Sunday. This is only a period of about 40 hours and certainly does not fit Jesus' prediction of three days and three nights.

"For as Jonah was three days and three nights in the belly of a whale, so the Son of Man will be three days and three nights in the heart of the earth." - Matthew 12:40

The problem is neither with Jesus' prediction nor with the Bible. The problem is with our tradition that misses a very important fact of the events of that week in Jesus' ministry.

The Bible tells us that Jesus was crucified on the Day of Preparation for the Passover Sabbath. (Mark 15:42; Luke 23:54; John 19:14, 31). The Hebrew calendar begins each day at the evening twilight of the previous day. For example, the Jewish Friday begins at what would be the beginning of Thursday evening on our calendars. The Day of Preparation for Passover was always the 14th of the Hebrew month Abib (also known as Nisan). Passover began that evening, the 15th.

Each year Passover fell on a different day of the week. Passover was always a Special Sabbath. So except for those years when Passover happened to fall on Saturday, which was the regular

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weekly Sabbath, there would be two Sabbaths during Passover week.

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Jesus was raised from the dead on the morning after the regular weekly Sabbath. It is never said that He was raised the morning after the Passover Sabbath. This would indicate that, as was most often the case, Passover did not fall that year on the regular weekly Sabbath.

The events of this most detailed week of Jesus' life come together perfectly if in that year the Passover Sabbath fell on Friday. That would place Jesus' crucifixion on the day of Preparation for the Passover (Thursday); followed by the Passover Sabbath (Friday); followed by the weekly Sabbath (Saturday); followed by the resurrection Sunday morning. Jesus was in the grave, as He had predicated, three days and three nights.

The problem with our tradition is that those who established the tradition failed to realize that there are two Sabbaths during Passover week rather than just one.

Back then, they had one TV, or radio, in the house - not a TV in every room. And the TV had a small screen the size of a pizza dish, not a screen the size of the

state of Montana. In the kitchen, they blended and stirred by hand because they didn't have electric machines to do everything for you. When they packaged a fragile item to send in the mail, they used wadded up newspaper to cushion it, not styrofoam or plastic bubble wrap.

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Back then, they didn't fire up an engine and burn gasoline just to cut the lawn. They used a push mower that ran on human power. They exercised by working so they didn't need to go to a health club to run on treadmills that operate on electricity. But she's right, they didn't have the green thing back then.

They drank from a fountain when they were thirsty, instead of using a cup or a plastic bottle every time they had a drink of water. They refilled pens with ink, instead of buying a new pen, and they replaced the razor blades in a razor instead of throwing away the whole razor just because the blade got dull. But they didn't have the green thing back then.

Back then, people took the streetcar and kids rode their bikes to school or rode the school bus, instead of turning their moms into a 24-hour taxi service. They had one electrical outlet in a room, not an entire bank of sockets to power a dozen appliances.
