PC Baseball Tops No. 16 Clemson in Thriller, 4-3 HHS Howe Grad Steven Richardson pitches win

GREENVILLE, S.C. – The Presbyterian College Blue Hose baseball team rallied after surrendering a two-run lead against the No. 16 Clemson Tigers on Wednesday night, scoring a go-ahead run in the eighth inning to hand the Tigers a loss at Fluor Field, 4-3.

The team's seventh straight win improves PC's record to 11-6 overall while the Tigers fall to 7-7 on the year. Prior to Wednesday's victory, the Blue Hose had not defeated Clemson since 1949.

"The guys played extraordinarily hard and did a great job overall. It was just a team effort and we're excited about this team and hopefully we can keep up this momentum," said Head Coach Elton Pollock. "I'm proud of the overall effort of our players and coaches and definitely the support of our fans."

Chandler Knox (Columbia, S.C.) earned the decision for PC but **Steven Richardson (Howe, Texas)** set the table with his impressive pitching as the starter, scattering six hits and three earned runs over six and one-third innings of work while striking out five.

Knox allowed only one hit and let no Tiger score in two and twothirds innings, striking out three in the process.

Brad Zebedis (Rock Hill, S.C.) and Tony Micklon (Sumter, S.C.) each turned in two hits and Zebedis, Aaron Preston (Goose Creek, S.C.) and John Wagner (Olney, Md.) each drove in a run.

Tied 3-3 in the top of the eighth, the Blue Hose would mount their late rally to decide the contest. Micklon led off the inning with a single through the left side before Preston moved him to second on a sacrifice bunt. Clemson pitcher Joseph Moorefield replaced Justin Sarrant, promptly walking Nate Horton (Spartanburg, S.C.) and then leaving the game in favor of Alex Frederick.

A Kyle Galloway (Mint Hill, N.C.) strikeout moved the situation to two on, two out. Kenny Bryant (Goose Creek, S.C.) stepped into the box, replacing John Wagner. Frederick threw a pitch in the dirt to Bryant, advancing Micklon to third and Horton to second.

Bryant, battling against the Tiger pitcher, hit a ball back to Frederick whose throw to first base proved problematic for Richie Shaffer and Micklon scored on the error. The Blue Hose then led, 4-3, the first lead for PC since the fifth inning. Andrew Williams (Augusta, Ga.) then popped up to end the inning, but the damage was done.

From the first batter, the Blue Hose wasted little time putting a hit on the board and converted shortly thereafter. Staring at two strikes, leadoff hitter Williams kicked off the proceedings with a deep double to right center. After two PC outs, Brad Zebedis sent a frozen rope down the left field line past a diving John Hinson to bring home Williams and give the Blue Hose a 1-0 lead the team would take into the second.

A perfect first from lefthander **Steven Richardson** kept Clemson scoreless and PC struck again in the second.

One out down, Nate Horton singled on a full count to bring up Tyler Hill (Goose Creek, S.C.), who followed suit with a single of his own. Kyle Galloway replaced Hill as a pinch-runner and he would be put to work, as John Wagner dug out a two-strike single to bring home Horton and extend the Blue Hose lead to 2-0.

Despite Andrew Williams reaching first on a fielding error, PC could not convert with the bases loaded and ended the inning with the 2-0 advantage.

The Clemson offense emerged in the second to cut into the Blue Hose lead. Richie Shaffer led off with a single and reached third on a John Hinson double immediately after. Shaffer then reached home thanks to a sacrifice fly from Phil Pohl, but **Richardson** slammed the door with two consecutive swinging strikeouts to end the inning still ahead, 2-1.

Clemson pitcher Will Lamb saw his day on the mound end as Justin Sarratt replaced him at the top of the third but the Tigers' luck against Brad Zebedis stayed the same, as the freshman catcher duplicated his earlier at bat from the first inning with a leadoff double down the left field line.

After a Tony Micklon sacrifice bunt to move Zebedis over, Aaron Preston sent a line drive that shortstop Jason Stolz couldn't handle and Zebedis scored on the error. Two outs later, the Blue Hose ended the half-inning holding a 3-1 lead.

The PC defense showed off its skill in the bottom of the fourth inning, turning a 5-4-3 double play to clear the bases of Richie Shaffer and Jeff Schaus before **Richardson** ended the inning with his fourth strikeout of the game.

Phil Pohl led off the bottom of the fifth wasting little time in scoring for Clemson, tagging a first-pitch home run to left field to draw the Tigers to within one, 3-2. Clemson kept up the scoring, eventually tying the game at 3-3 on a Steve Wilkerson single to bring around Jon McGibbon. **Richardson** escaped the inning with no further damage and the fifth ended in a 3-3 deadlock.

Richardson held Clemson scoreless in the sixth and came out in favor of Chandler Knox after one batter in the seventh. Knox held the fort, keeping the Tigers off of the scoreboard.

Knox continued his dominance over the Tigers by allowing no runs in the eighth, entering the ninth charged with the task of holding the one-run lead.

With the tying run on first base after a Pohl single, the Blue Hose showed nerves of steel as catcher Nate Horton erased the hit by picking off pinch-runner Brad Miller. Knox then struck out Chris Epps looking to seal the win, 4-3.

PC begins Big South play this weekend with a three-game series on the road against High Point.

GCC Cultural Arts series In March features scientist and violinist

Grayson County College's Cultural Arts Series continues in March with an oceanographic science lecture and a performance by an international violinist. The series meets weekly on Wednesdays at 12:30 pm in GCC's Cruce Stark Auditorium, located in the Arts & Communications Center on the college's Main Campus in Denison. Most presentations last one hour although some may go longer. All events are free and open to the public.

On March 23, "Eavesdropping on Our Neighbor: The Gulf of Mexico" is presented by Dr. Garry Jeffress, professor of geographic information science and director of the Conrad Blucher Institute for Surveying Sciences at Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi. He "eavesdrops" on the Gulf of Mexico with 46 in-water stations along the coast that send back real-time information every six minutes.

Jeffress and his team monitor water levels, wind speed and direction, water current, salinity, Ph, and other data that relates to oil spills, hurricanes, NASA launches, and a host of environmental studies. This presentation is an inside look at the information used by the National

Weather Service, ship captains, researchers, astronauts, commercial fisherman, sports teams, and others.

On March 30, "One Man, One Violin" brings a performance by Jack Glatzer, an internationally known violinist, who was born and raised in Dallas. Drawing on his academic background, he often incorporates pictures, slides or video into his presentation to aid the audience in better understanding the music.

Glatzer began playing the violin at the age of 5 and performed as a soloist with the Dallas Symphony when he was 14. At 17, he won the nation's most prestigious violin competition and performed as a

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Hush Puppies

- 1 egg
- 2 cups buttermilk
- 2 cups corn meal
- 1-1/2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 Tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1 Tablespoon baking powder
- Cayenne pepper, to taste 6 Tablespoons chopped onion

Fat for deep-frying

Beat egg and buttermilk together and set aside. Mix all dry ingredients and add chopped onion. Blend in egg-buttermilk mixture. Heat fat to 370 degrees. Drop hush puppies, a few teaspoonfuls at a time, into the fat. Fry about two to three minutes or until evenly browned. They will float to the surface when cooked. Drain on absorbent paper and serve at once.

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Remembering Columbia

On Feb. 1, 2003, as the world followed the return of Space Shuttle Columbia, something deadly went wrong with the flight over East Texas. In seconds, the shuttle and its crew plummeted to the ground in Sabine County.

The Columbia broke apart after a slab of foam came loose, gouged a wing and allowed superheated air into the wing. The shuttle began to tremble, the crew was unable to regain control, and the wing was eventually ripped apart.

Efforts to find the remnants of Columbia and its crew were begun and in less than two weeks, the remains of the seven astronauts were returned to their families.

On March 27, as the search continued, a helicopter crashed and two more lives were lost.

I heard an advertisement this morning that invited viewers to some Internet address and learn who might be searching for you. I didn't write the Internet address, which precluded my being able to see who might be searching for me -- an old flame, perhaps, with the emphasis on old.

However, I do not own a business that grosses approximately \$350,000 a year. As a matter of fact, my accountant told me this year that if I don't begin to sell more than \$100 worth of services a year, the government is going to assume that I am a hobbyist and not a businesswoman. Of course, I didn't claim any business expenses on my income tax this year, although I had some, but it doesn't seem right to claim expenses when I can't get anyone to pay me for my work.

Except for that, everything else was at least acceptably sort of accurate. My last place of residence before I came to Sherman was Odessa, Texas. I am on Facebook, which I must have signed up for, although I don't remember doing it or why. It was probably because everyone at the church I attend is on Facebook and I kept getting invitations to be their friend.

In any case, I am on Facebook and there is a picture of me that I did not authorize because it makes me look as if at least one of my jaw teeth on the left side is missing, which it is not. There are, or at least there were, several other pictures of me that I did not authorize because if I had

Today, beside the J.R. Huffman Public Library in Hemphill, the county seat of Sabine County, is a sparkling new museum that honors the memory of the nine victims of the Columbia disaster.

Inside the Patricia Huffman Smith Museum are exhibits that were donated by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), as well as families of the astronauts and others.

Each of the seven astronauts -- Commander Rick D. Husband, pilot William McCool, mission specialists David M. Brown and Laurel B. Clark, flight engineer Kalpana Chawla, payload commander Michael P. Anderson, and payload specialist Han Ramon -- are remembered by displays. So are Charles Krenek and Jules F. Mier Jr., the victims of the helicopter crash.

The Museum also honors Patricia Huffman Smith, who died in 2010 of cancer. Her husband Albert donated the funds for the Columbia museum.

The museum houses space-related artifacts and informational items from NASA, its contractors and others. Interactive simulator devices and a digital learning center helps educate visitors.

The Museum is open from 10 am to 5 pm Monday through Saturday.

wanted a picture of someone who looked like my Aunt Sadie on my Facebook page, I would have put her picture there.

The free information also included access to my blog, Aces Paces, which is on blogspot.com. At least one person has found the blog and written comments about the blog. One of the comments was that I drive him crazy, which pleases me no end. I can only hope that he is committed by the time of the next election and so cannot vote until declared competent.

If I had wanted to pay for more information that I did not know is public information, I could have paid \$39.95 to get a comprehensive security check, complete with credit rating from three different agencies and current income. I was almost curious enough to spend the money to find out what they know that I might not know. The operative word is almost.

I remembered when all of us teachers, many of whom, like me, had written a thesis and had been paid to write professionally, were forced to take the TECAT to prove that we were literate (this at great cost to the state), that we could get the actual score on the test if we would send \$15 to the grading agency. Fat chance! I suspected that the tests were graded in a warehouse by university students who were at least half high either from boredom or smoking pot and I wasn't about to contribute a penny to their employer.

I found my address and got an aerial shot -- a real photograph -of my house, complete with the magnolia tree on the south side of the front yard and the oak on the north side and the maple and the fruitless mulberry in the backyard. I had no idea my house was so impressive. I apparently have done better than I would have thought had I not seen the information about me on the Internet.

There was more -- lots more -- and all of it free to anyone who wanted to take time to look it up on the Internet.

Not long ago, a person on one of the quilt sites I frequent on the Internet was concerned about whether she shopped at stores on the Internet, unsavory people would be able to trace her whereabouts. Here is the skinny. Savory and unsavory people can find you within less than five minutes.

But the truth is they always could find you. If you paid local property taxes, for gas, lights, water, wrote a check, mailed a letter in an envelope with a return address, bought an insurance policy, used a credit card -- in other words, if you were engaging in normal activities of living, you were always findable. It just took whoever was looking for you a little longer than it does now.

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The Confusing Costs of Continuing Care

Health Care by Catey Hill

When 85-year-old AI Green was ready to make his last move, he settled on a residential community that offered tiered care – independent, assisted, and nursing – near his alma mater, Penn State. But it wasn't as easy as picking a place and packing a moving van. First Green faced many decisions: Did he want unlimited health care at a relatively fixed monthly cost? Should his up-front fees be refunded to his heirs upon death? Each decision had a price--and it wasn't trivial, he says: "Some people pay double what others do."

Some 800,000 people -- and counting -- have already confronted the confusing costs associated with "continuing care facilities," which have grown rapidly over the last 20 years to almost 2,000. Before the recession slowed construction, the industry had added another 200 facilities this decade, according to preliminary data from Ziegler Inc., an investment bank that underwrites such facilities. And as baby boomers -- and their parents -- age, even more will have to confront the confusing costs of continuing care.

But more facilities means more unique, byzantine fee structures, critics say. For retirees who are managing a finite nest egg, the distinctions are critical: A 10-year stay at one facility might cost well over \$1 million; at another, a resident might pay just \$300,000. And even within a single facility, the primary costs -- the entry and monthly charges -- can be structured in many different ways, making it hard to compare the value of one to another, says Steve Maag, the director for assisted living at the Association of Home & Services for the Aging. "If you've seen one CCRC [continuing care residential community], you've seen one CCRC," says Maag.

The menu of fees is long, and what's included varies widely by facility. The biggest charge is usually a move-in fee that's roughly equivalent to the price of buying a house in the same area, but often with all the money required up-front. If you want your heirs to get any of that money back when you die, you'll usually pay more to move-in--often much more. Then there's a monthly fee, which might cover basic health care but add high daily fees for the use of comprehensive care services. The monthly charge at one facility might also

include a generous meal plan, for example, while another residence charging about the same could offer a stripped-down plan with the option to upgrade at a higher cost. What's more, each level of care – independent, assisted, nursing – may have its own set of amenities and services at different prices.

The appeal seems obvious. The facilities are like a campus, with independent homes or apartments, assisted living "dorms" that provide more ongoing support and monitoring for people who need occasional help, and nursing care for the very ill. This means people don't have to leave the community as they age or rely on a family member to figure out where and how to care for them. That's a concept that appeals to more people than ever: Americans are five times more concerned about burdening their families with caregiving responsibilities than they are about dying, according to a new Genworth study.

But the fees are far from appealing. For one, they can be high. It's not unusual to see a \$400,000 entrance fee and a \$3,000 monthly payment, which means a resident could spend \$760,000 over a decade. And that's if the fees were to stay the same. Often, they don't, rising significantly even for existing residents. Ballooning health care costs are partly to blame: From 2009 to 2010, basic assisted living costs increased 5.2% according to the MetLife Mature Market Institute, compared to just 1.5% for the cost of most goods and services.

Voter ID

On Monday, March 21, the Texas House will take up and consider Senate Bill 14, relating to voter identification. As I wrote a few weeks ago, voter I.D. was placed on the governor's emergency items list. This designation allowed the legislation to move through the legislative process faster than a regular bill.

SB 14 has already passed through the senate, the House Select Committee on Voter Identification and Voter Fraud and has been placed on the House Calendar for Monday, March 21. The bill has 5 House sponsors and 84 co-sponsors, well over half of the membership of the House.

The bill will require a photo identification card in order to vote at a polling place. Acceptable forms of photo identification are a driver's license or personal identification card issued to the person by the Department of Public Safety that has not expired or that expired no earlier than 60 days before the date of presentation; a United States military identification card that contains the person's photograph that has not expired or that expired no earlier than 60 days before the date of presentation; United States citizenship certificate issued to the person that contains the person's photograph; a United States passport issued to the person that has not expired or that expired no earlier than 60 days before the date of presentation; or a license to carry a concealed handgun issued to the person by the Department of Public Safety that has not expired or that expired no earlier than 60 days before the date of presentation.

The proposed legislation also provides accommodations for disabled and the elderly. SB 14 would also increase the penalty for an illegal voting offense from a 3rd degree felony to a 2nd degree felony and increases the penalty for an attempted illegal voting offense from a Class A misdemeanor to a state jail felony.

When this bill is brought on the floor this week, there will be many amendments offered and debated before it is brought up for a vote. Should this bill pass with amendments, it will go to the senate for approval of the amendments or if not, to a conference committee.

As president he paid for all of his own travel expenses and food.

Neighborhood Genealogist – Getting started

by Dale Rideout

Genealogy is the study of where you came from. To me it is a study of history and how my family was part of that history.

I have been doing genealogy research for over 30 years now. It is a very rewarding hobby for those who are interested. If you are not interested in doing this type of research, then by all means feel free to quit now. You will not enjoy it. If you are interested in genealogy, then read on.

There are two rules I teach all my genealogy students. Follow them carefully. First – Believe everything you hear and read about your ancestors. Be sure to record and document it carefully. The second rule is – Do Not believe anything you hear or read about your ancestors, but record and document it carefully.

What! This man is crazy. He just contradicted himself and canceled out everything he said. Well, no I didn't. You will find that you are surrounded with faulty memories, family legends, falsified documents, and many other items that will lead you astray. That is why I say do not believe any of what you get. Yet often you will hear outrageous and seemingly fabricated stories that in reality are true, so believe it all. When you get your information documented, then you can begin to sift for the actual facts. Know that you will have errors, but try to keep them to a minimum.

First you need to get yourself some forms to keep your information on. There are many providers

and the forms are almost all alike. For starters, let me suggest that you go to the website, www. Familytreemagazine.com/freeforms. On this page you will see the line "Basic Charts and Worksheets." Click this sentence. It takes you to a page where you can download charts for free. Let's begin with three charts: 1) Five generations Ancestry Chart; 2) Family Group Sheet; and 3) Relationship chart. Download and print out each of these. The Five Generations Chart and the Family Group Sheet are necessary for your records, and you will need several copies of each. Start with about five of each and have them in hand as you continue this article. You may get very confused if you do not follow step by step to learn the process.



Now, we will fill out our first chart. Take one of the Five generations Ancestry Chart and write your own name at line # 1. Use your maiden name if you are a woman. Continue filling in the information that you have for yourself. On the dates I prefer to have my students put the date down in the order used by military and Europeans: Day Month Year (24 January 2011.) Get in that habit and it probably save you a lot of misery later. Use the maiden name for all women in your data, if you have it. For places of birth, marriage, death or other events, list them by city or town, county, state, country.

Now get one of the Family Group Sheets. It is fairly self explanatory. Fill this sheet out for your parents. Give as much information as you have and leave the rest blank. This is where you will list all your brothers and sisters as well as yourself for this family.

him. Write the number 2 in the box by his name. On chart number 2, put his name and information at the place of number 1. At the top of the chart put the number 2 where it says, "Chart #____." Then on this same chart fill in the line, "1 on this chart = 16 on chart # 1." Your GGGrandmother, number 17 will have chart number 3. which you will fill out in the same manner as number 2 for your GGGrandfather. Then fill in a Family Group Sheet for your GGGrandmother and GGGrandfather.

When you have completed all the information you know about yourself (OK. You don't know the death date or place for yourself so skip it and anything else you do not know), go to the top, left corner of your chart and you will see the words, "Chart #_____." Fill this in with the number 1 (one.) It is your first chart. You see "1 on this chart = ____ on chart no. _____." Leave this blank on this chart, but you will fill it in on your others. If this seems too confusing, leave them all blank and you will understand it later.

Go to the line numbered 2, and list your FATHER, not your mother but your father. In general the man is always listed above the wife on an ancestral chart. Fill in your father's information. Now go to number 3 and fill in your mother's information. Back to the Ancestry Chart. Number 4 will be the name of your father's father, and number 5 your father's mother. Complete what information you have for them and then a Family Group Sheet with you father's brothers and sisters, etc.

Now go to 6 and 7. Your mother's father will be number 6 and her mother will be number 7. Complete with all the information you have and do a Family Group Sheet for them.

You are beginning to get the idea. Numbers 8,9 and 10,11 and 12,13 and 14,15 will be your great-grandparents. Do them the same way.

Now comes the hook for extending your family history. Numbers 16 through 31 will be your great-greatgrandparents. Again, the man on top and the woman below. On these lines you can put only the name and save the other information for another chart. Your GGGrandfather, number 16 will have chart number 2 for Continue down the Ancestry chart with all you GGGrandparents.

Wow, that was a lot of work, but it gives you a real basis for your genealogy studies.

Each month I will give you some more information on genealogy and how to research and find out just who you really are. Have a lot of fun.
