103 E. Haning St. has sold from Paris Palacios to Tom and Leslie Defrange

On Friday, the paperwork was finalized for the 103 E. Haning St. building to change ownership from Paris Palacios to Tom and Leslie Defrange. Palacios

has ran a hair salon called Designer Cuts in the building since 2005. After being downtown for 10 years, she said she will miss it greatly.

"I'm going to miss my building." said Palacios. "I love my building, but it's going to somebody who cares about the town and the integrity of Howe and that

makes me more comfortable to let it go."

The sale of the building makes six of the seven units having been sold to new owners in a little over a year. The building that houses Don's Smokehouse was the first to sell. In August, M.E. Curtis sold the corner hardware store to Monte Walker, who is currently renovating it to become the Chamber of Commerce and Economic Development office. In January, Georgia Caraway purchased the three buildings, 107-111 E. Haning St. and is refurbishing those units as well. The entire row on the south side of downtown are

year, Howe Independent School District currently has two Board of Trustee seats coming up for re-election. The

incumbents are Mark Abner and Bruce Dawsey. They will be challenged by three individuals including former

Howe ISD teacher Janie Finney, attorney Micah Belden and office administrator Amber Dimayuga. Pat Stewart is not seeking another term.

Jeff Stanley, mayor of Howe will run unopposed as will council members

full and now that the old Chisum's building is occupied, by Founders Day all of the available spaces in downtown will be full of businesses.

"When I first moved down here, it was just me and Mr. Clinton except City Hall and the fire department." said Palacios. "I started decorating for Halloween and it took me a couple of years, but after that, the kids expect me to be here and that's what I'll miss the most, the kids."

Palacios commented that it's even harder to leave now that things are picking up downtown and that Howe had the best Christmas celebration in downtown in her 10 years there.

Palacios will be moving her salon, Designer

Cuts, to 1014 FM 902 just east of Howe. The 532-6151 phone number for Designer Cuts will stay the same as in town.

"We're going to put a little cabin outside next to my house and get it fixed up." said Palacios. "I'm hoping it won't take too long to get it up and ready."

But in the meantime, she will make house calls if needed, but has been given 30 days by Defrange before she has to completely move out.

103 E. Haning was constructed in 1900 and was purchased by M.E. Curtis in 1999 from Bob Estep, who purchased the building in 1978 from Lowell Thompson. While Thompson's Hardware, the building was easily identifiable

because of the large Zenith Radio sign that hung above the windows.

"It was a real estate investment and a way to expend the space needed for the business." said Tom Defrange. He and his wife Leslie operate TLD Design Consulting. They are in business for design technology for new construction and innovations. He has been operating inside #1 Fitness workout centers on Haning Street, but with the business growing so fast and having 12 employees, Defrange said that they needed something bigger in a hurry.

The plans are to build out the back 75 percent of the 2,500 square feet building for offices for his company and the front 25 percent will be a retail environment with a top-end hair salon in mind. Their ability to lease the front quarter allows the downtown district a variety of options for consumers. One of the Defrange's ideas are a hair salon boutique.

"My brother owns a salon in downtown Dallas and travels all over the world." said Tom Defrange. "He's going to help me design the interior of the boutique area based on what you would typically see when you walk into a Dallas high-end salon."

They will be doing extensive work on the inside of the building including separate heating and cooling systems for the front and the back as well as removing the beadboard ceiling and fully insulating the interior. Defrange plans to build five offices in the back with a break room, kitchenette and open cubicle area of ten cubicles. The plan is to try

and keep the original hardwood floors.

Defrange says that it will take about two months at least two months until construction is completed. That would make all available spaces occupied by Founders Day weekend which begins downtown on Friday night, April 24 with the Howe Area Chamber of Commerce Hall of Honor induction ceremony.

The offices in the back will be completed first before they start

working on the retail portion in the front of the building.

"If it's not going to be a salon up front, it's going to be something on the retail side." said Defrange. "We'll put the initial barrier wall in up front and then plumb the building, run electric and get started."

With the work that the Defranges will be doing on the 103 building, it means that 101, 103, 105, 107, and 111 will have all been recently renovated. The only one in the mix

Mayor Stanley was originally appointed to the position in 2008 by the council and then sworn in to his first term in 2009. He came in a time when Howe was on the fringe of bankruptcy.

"The city staff did not get along with each other, the surrounding cities, the county agencies, or state agencies." said Stanley in a May, 2014 interview.

"We now have very professional employees that work together to find solutions, not problems. The city has the respect of the surrounding cities, the county and state agencies. The City is putting money in the bank, and not bleeding out. And, we are ready for new development."

Bill French will serve another term on the city council, which will be the second of two separate rounds

in the seat. He also served one term in 2001-2003. French pushed to honor L.B. Kirby by renaming a street after him.

Debbie Lowery will also start her second term on the city council. Lowery spearheaded the efforts to try and land Hawaiian Falls in Howe.

Both Bruce Dawsey and Mark Abner are each seeking their third consecutive term as a member of the Howe ISD Board of Trustees.

The current members of the Howe ISD Board of Trustees are Pat Stewart, Greg Akins, Brad Anderson, Clint Catching and Scott Renfro.

Since there will be no change with the mayor and city council, the group of council members will remain with French, Lowery, Georgia Richardson, Dennis Bozeman and Sam Haigis.

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Holliday ends Howe's season, 61-56

A year ago, the Bulldogs finished 9-19, snuck into the playoffs and quickly exited to the hands of Sunnyvale, 72-31. Within a month, 24-year veteran Howe head coach Tim Rose had announced his retirement. It wasn't long before veteran coach Tim Short was hired to take over for Rose. In his first year, Short improved the win total from nine to 21 and became the fourth head coach for Howe to coach in a playoff game since 1970. Tom Skipworth coached the boys to a playoff run 1970, but the program went 16 years before John Burkhart was able to get the 'Dogs back in post-season play in 1986, Rose entered the playoffs on several occasions over his lengthy stay, and now Short, in his first year has revamped the Bulldogs basketball program by entering the playoffs in his first season. That's something that hasn't been done since Burkhart's 1985-86 team.

The toughest losses are the ones in which seem in-hand for the majority of the game and that certainly happened Wednesday

night in Decatur. Due to the recent ice storm, the game was moved from it's original date of Tuesday night and postponed until Wednesday evening.

Howe's first period went just as planned and probably even a little bit better. The Bulldogs at one point took a 12 point lead when Michael Kehrer stole a pass and went the other way for the easy layup to put Howe up 19-7. Moments later, Howe took a 19-9 lead into the second period.

In the second, Holliday's Reed Cummings came alive and scored 10 of his 14 first half points. Cummings used his large body to gain position throughout the evening and when Holliday's guards realized they could lob it down to him, it became a heavy mismatch for Howe.

The Bulldogs saw their 10 point first period lead stripped down to one and went to the locker room clinging to a one point lead, 29-28.

"I knew when we lost that 10 point lead that it was going to come down the the wire." said Short. "We knew how good they were inside."

In the third period, the lead got back up to eight win 1:41 left when Griffin Underwood ripped a three-pointer. However, Holliday scored six unanswered points to cut the lead to 42-40 entering the fourth period.

Unbelievably, not one substitution was made by Holliday as they went the entire game with their starting five. Howe's only bench player for the game Sam Akins, who switched in and out with Easton Ross and Michael Kehrer at times.

With 6:19 left to go in the game, Holliday took the lead when Carson Rogers drilled a three-pointer from

three feet behind the arc. The Eagles led 46-44 and extended the lead moments later when Rogers stole the ball and drove the other way and scored to make it 48-44 and the largest lead of the game for Holliday.

With 3:36 left, Sam Akins knocked down two free-throws to narrow the Holliday lead to 52-50. With under three minutes left, Akins gave Howe the lead when he drilled a three-pointer from the corner. Howe led 54-53 at that point, but Mrozinski would foul Easton Stringer as he made a layup and with the free throw, Holliday went up 56-54. Stringer would later hit a nine-foot jumper to up the Eagle lead and Howe ran out of time on their effort to regain the lead. The Bulldogs finished their season with a record of 21-11.

Former Howe athlete setting college records



Morgan Bailey on her way to a school record in the 60 m hurdles

After a successful high school career in Howe by placing fourth at the state track meet in 2013, Morgan Bailey is now eclipsing collegiate records for Friends University in Wichita, Kansas.

The daughter of Amy and Kelly Lindsay and Jim Bailey, graduated from Howe in 2013 after moving here in the second grade. While in high school, Bailey was on the state 4x800 meter relay team her freshman year. Her senior year, she placed fourth in the 300 meter hurdles with a lifetime best 45.72 time. She was unable to run track during her sophomore year at Howe due to knee surgery to repair torn anterior cruciate ligament. However, she placed in all other years in all other events.

Ironically, it wasn't track that she went to Friends University to play. She was given a partial athletic scholarship as well as academic scholarship to play basketball. After playing one season on the junior varsity team, she decided that she was done with basketball almost a year and tried out for the track team.

Unable to get on the roster last spring, Bailey had to wait until this season to start participating. In her first ever collegiate event on Dec. 13, Bailey set the Friendship University school record by running a 9.22 in the 60 meter hurdles.

"I've done the 200 (meters) and the 4x400 (meter) relay and I did the

long and triple jump and high jump at conference just to get points, but it's not something I normally do." said Bailey.

Her 9.22 time in the 60 meters qualified her for B-Standard for nationals and in the Jan. 21 event, Bailey was named Kansas Collegiate Athletic Conference Women's Indoor Track Athlete of the Week by finishing second of 17 in the 60 meter hurdles with a time of 9.26. She was also on the 4x400 relay team that placed fourth. At conference, she ran a 26.17 in the 200 meters.

Just recently, Bailey broke her own school record with a time of 9.17 in the 60 meter hurdles. She is scheduled to run in the nationals competition this week but is waiting on the results from an MRI from a left hip injury that she received during her last hurdles event.

After nationals are over with, Bailey will start with outdoor track and then says that she's planning on not coming back to track.

"I plan on going to law school so, depending on if I get accepted, going to go to (Texas) A&M so I can go to Texas and start gaining internships and connections." said Bailey. "I'm coming back to ensure that I have a future in whatever I'm doing."

Bailey says that she has looked at A&M's 60 meter times just to see if she might want to walk-on and try to compete at that level.

"My 9.17 time will almost allow me to compete with D-1 (division one) schools." said Bailey. "I was going to see how I did and then contact the A&M coach, but for now I'm just going to focus on school."



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Learn about your antiques and collectibles with Georgia Caraway



This is a wonderful time of year to get in your car and take that genealogical trip that you have been planning to do for years. It is a good time to visit and interview relatives, perform research in libraries, explore cemeteries, visit courthouses and locate old family photographs.

As we search for the facts about our relatives and ancestors, we should research the photographs that we collect. How many times have you heard about people throwing old photographs into the garbage or placing them in garage sales or flea markets because they could not be identified?

I suggest that if photographs are part of your ancestral archive, even if they are not identified, save them. Photographs can be compared for likenesses and perhaps with time and research, you will be able to identify the subjects.

Here are some helpful tips to the process of identifying and cataloging family photos:

1. Besides the human image, what other identifying clues are there in the photographs. Are there any notes, dates or locations somewhere in the photo? Check the back and the bottom of the photo for imprints of the photographer. Since this was a form of advertisement, photographers often included their location. Normally, people went to a studio to have photographs taken, however, don't

depend totally on the city imprinted on the photo. Photographers often took their equipment via train, wagon, or automobile to towns other than their home-base studio.

2. Can you identify the time period of the photograph by the ages of the subjects, the style of clothing, props (furniture), hairstyles, interiors of houses? Look for a favorite book, toy or some other personal object.

3. Ask relatives about the people in the photographs or their settings. Write down any hints about who they think the subject might be.

4. Measure the photograph. The size of the photographs can indicate time periods when specific sizes were popular. Cabinet cards were mounted on a card and typically measured 4.25x6.5 inches and were popular from about 1866 to 1900. Cartes-de-visite were also card mounted, but were smaller, typically 2.4x4 inches. They were introduced in the mid 1850s and were popular until almost 1900. Other types of photography such as ambrotypes, daguerreotypes, tintypes and postcards also give clues as to timeframe. A previous column covered all of these types.

5. What is the condition of the photograph? Is it falling apart, torn, or faded? Is it an original or a photocopy? Consider scanning photos that are in poor condition so as to preserve the image before any more damage is done.

6. If you are not in possession of the original, who has it? If it is in the possession of a relative, museum, or library, find out what their procedures or feelings are about allowing you to have it duplicated or scanned.

There are several websites that will be most helpful in your search. The George Eastman House web page contains a photographic timeline and searchable database pertaining to

UNITE was at AT&T Stadium on Thursday and had contacted Howe High School Principal Michael Smiley about stopping and doing a presentation while in the area.

"They quoted me the price on what it was going to cost, so we started looking for donors." said Smiley. "The City of Howe, Team Bonner Chevrolet and the Howe Police Department all donated money so that we could have it here."

Smiley said that the simulator part is fun for the kids, but the videos that were shown to the students made an impact of the true consequences.

"We talked to them about what happens if they kill someone." said Smiley. "That was impactful."

Students participated in the program and were ticketed based on their abilities or lack thereof.

Howe's that...

DO YOU HAVE A SCORECARD? - A lot of people in this world keep score of what's happening in their lives. They keep a mental tally of who sends them Christmas cards so they won't send a card to someone who doesn't reciprocate. They keep track of whose turn it is to write a letter or make a phone call. They don't want to give unless they receive something in turn.

Then there are others who keep score of every little incident where someone has "wronged" them. And even if the person has asked for forgiveness, the person says to himself, "Well, I forgive him, but I won't forget what he did." They don't realize that true forgiveness wipes the slate clean - as if the "wrong" never even happened. Instead of erasing it in the same manner one would erase a chalkboard, they use some "white-out" so they can still see that a wrong has been done in the past and when they see that small amount of white on the page they can remember.

The apostle Paul in the 13th chapter of I Corinthians talked about love. He said love "keeps no score of wrongs" (NIV). When we keep a scorecard, we are not showing love. Instead, we are being petty and selfish, thinking only of ourselves.

Keeping a scorecard causes friction in families and other relationships. You only have to read "Ann Landers" or "Dear Abby" to see examples of marriages falling apart, friendships lost or family quarrels all caused by this scorekeeping mentality.

Instead of keeping a record of all that others do to us, there is a better way to live: "Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It is not rude, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always hopes, always perseveres. Love never fails."

Those words, written by Paul in I Corinthians 13, were written about 2,000 years ago. But they still hold true today. The best life we can live is based on what we find in the Bible. Put it into practice and see for yourself.

Head Coach Fryar Resigns

Howe head coach and athletic director Jim Fryar has resigned to take a similar position with Jacksboro High School, located about 50 miles northwest of Fort Worth.

In an emergency meeting held Friday, Feb. 23, the Howe ISD board accepted Fryar's resignation effective immediately. Fryar has already begun work with the Class 2A school. Last year Jacksboro was second in their district behind Pilot Point and compiled a 9-2 record, falling to Electra in bi-district play. Jacksboro has also won state championships twice.

Fryar said, "I just felt it was time to look for new challenges. In the six years I have been at Howe, I couldn't have asked for better people to work with."

Fryar began working at Howe as an assistant coach in 1984 and was promoted to head coach in 1985. During his five years as head coach, he compiled a 40-16-1 record. He helped lead the Bulldogs to the playoffs five times in his six years with the team, including appearances in the regional playoffs in 1985 and 1989. In 1987, although the Bulldogs did not make the playoffs, they posted a 8-2 record, losing to Pottsboro and Tom Bean.

Jim and his wife Connie were instrumental in helping Howe to get a paved track and a weight room at the expanded field house. Connie has served as cheerleader sponsor in addition to her work teaching special education at the high school.

"Coach Fryar will be missed by me personally. Howe has been our second opportunity to work together and both experiences have been memorable ones. We have been friends for 16 years."

He added, "Speaking for the board and for myself, we certainly hate to lose Coach and Mrs. Fryar. Jim and Connie have given so much to our community and our kids. We certainly are a better school and community due to their having given us six years of

their careers. The relationships and influence they have had on our kids will last a lifetime. We will miss them and wish them well in all their endeavors."

Fryar feels the Howe football team has a bright future. "Our

junior varsity went undefeated last year and they allowed only 7 points to be scored against them all season," he said. "And the 8th grade team had an outstanding season. The future for Howe looks very strong."
