Games like Thursday night's 43-33 dramatic comeback win by Howe don't come along very often. As a matter of fact, the historical playoff record books cannot find any other situation where the Bulldogs came back from a depth of as many as 27 points to win a game and advance to the next round of the playoffs.

The Howe Bulldogs were left for dead with only 13:09 gone in the game trailing Edgwood (4-7) by a score of 27-0. But the 'Dogs dug deeper than the grave they were laying in and pushed themselves above the daisies and took their first lead of the night with 6:58 left in the third quarter. That means the

Faith

Selfishness is one sign of immaturity. Babies are completely self-centered. They scream if they don't get what they want when they want it. All they are aware of are their own needs and desires. They can't say thanks for anything. They can't help others; they can't give anything. They can only receive. There's nothing wrong with that when it occurs in the natural stage of infancy but to see a child whose development is arrested so that they never get beyond that stage of helpless selfishness is a tragedy.

That is the spiritual state of many in the church today. They are preoccupied with self. They want their problems solved and their comfort level met. They're spiritually under developed, and they remain in a continuous state of helplessness. This is as tragic as a baby that never matures mentally. Just as a baby crawls along the floor, putting anything it finds in its mouth, spiritual babies don't know what is good for them and what isn't. Immaturity and failure to be discerning go together.

Paul appealed to Christians repeatedly to grow up spiritually. In Ephesians 4:14-15 he wrote, "We are no longer to be children, tossed here and there by waves, and carried about by every wind of doctrine, by the trickery of men, by craftiness in deceitful scheming; but speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in all

aspects into Him, who is the head, even Christ."

You grow spiritually by mature Christians "speaking the truth in love" to you and studying the truth of God's Word and allowing it to change your thoughts. As you absorb the truth of God's Word, you grow and are built up in confidence of who you are in Him. That process of spiritual growth is also a process of training for discernment.

"Though by this time you ought to be teachers, you have need again for someone to teach you the elementary principles of the truths of God, and you have come to need milk and not solid food. For everyone who partakes only of milk is not accustomed to the word of righteousness, for he is a babe. But solid food is for the mature, who because of practice have their senses trained to discern good and evil. Therefore leaving the elementary teaching about the Christ, let us press on to maturity," Hebrews 5:12-6:1.

The writer of Hebrews was telling his readers, "You're babies. You've been around long enough to be teachers, but instead I have to feed you milk. I have to keep giving you elementary things. You can't take solid food. You're not accustomed to the rich things of the Word-and that is tragic.'

Knowing and understanding the Word of God trains your senses to discern good and evil.

Discernment results from a carefully disciplined mind to take your thoughts captive and to make sure they match up to what the Truth in God's word is. Discernment is not a matter of feelings. The Old Testament closely linked discernment with a seasoned developed, biblically informed mind.

Most people are discerning about things that are important to them. People who regard a healthy diet as crucial watch carefully what they eat. They read the fine print on the package to see how many grams of fat it has and what percentage of the daily required nutrients it offers. People who work with dangerous chemicals must be very discerning. They study the procedures and the precautions very carefully to avoid any potentially lethal exposure. I know people who are very discerning sports enthusiasts. They watch a football game and can assess any offense, any defense, any play. They often feel they are more

the actual plays. They study statistics and averages and take it all very seriously.

Did you realize those are essentially the same mature skills that are required in spiritual discernment? Careful thought, keen interest, thorough analysis, close observation-together with alertness, attentiveness, thoughtfulness, and above all, a love of truth. We use maturity and discernment in whatever field of endeavor is important to us. Yet what could be more important than spiritual discernment? There is no valid excuse for contemporary Christians to be tolerant of what God calls sin - it reveals a spiritual apathy that is deadly evil. Tolerance is only a virtue to a man with no conviction. The church needs to regain its ability to be discerning by growing up spiritually. That means confronting the ungodly views this culture has adopted and diligently apply yourself to the unfailing Word of God. You are in this world to be different. You

discerning than whoever is calling cannot be a light in the darkness of this world if you don't think differently than the world thinks. The need to tolerate suggests that there is a disagreement. Jesus confronted sin in love. He never accepted it as healthy. The acceptance of wrong gives it the strength to grow. A discerning spirit will not accept sin to be right.

> You can't gain the maturity of discernment overnight, or through a mystical experience. Maturity is gained through walking out your Christianity, just as we learned to walk as toddlers by getting up and falling down. Don't stay down. You are created to get up and follow the teachings of Jesus Christ. Get into the depth of His word by applying it to your everyday situations. That's solid food.

Learn about antiques and collectibles with Georgia Caraway



Sewing implements are sought after by many collectors land include all sorts of items inclusing buttons, scissors, thimbles, darmers, thread, needlebooks, measuring tapes, and button bags. These rare small drawstring bags are the kind of accessory items that sewing collectors covet. The cotton fabric in the two examples shown in the picture appears to be from the 19th century, but the style of embroidered wording is mid-1920s. These bags were offered as kits in various designs and shapes through needle working magazines 107-109 Eat Haning in April. Store hours are such as Needlecraft Magazine or The Young Ladies Journal.

A charming one we have has the embroidered Collectibles, she has written four Denton words "The Button Family" and has members of the family like mother, father, children, and about the North Texas State Fair and Rodeo. even the family cat, all with heads and bodies made using bone underwear buttons. Underwear buttons traditionally have two large holes that make them ideal for depicting eyes. Most button heads were hand painted, however, in some examples the heavy thread they were attached with gave them their colorful eyes.

The owl bag is especially charming with its legend of "All kinds of owl buttons in here." It would be fun for a button collector to fill that bag with buttons depicting owls. Vintage owl buttons, however, are not easy to find.



These bags were most likely used for storing sewing and mending supplies-cloth and yarn on the inside and thimbles and thread in the outside pockets.

Needlework bags have been valued in the \$75 to \$175 range depending on design with the owl bag being in the lower range and the pocket-style with the children playing games valued in the upper range.

In thirty-five years of collecting, I have only found these two little bags. I am taking my own wise suggestion to heart and am now searching for owl buttons to fill my owl bag!

How good are the 'Dogs?

Howe is now 12-16-3 in the playoffs. Howe has never played area opponent West Rusk nor played average to 36.00 which is better at Forney's City Bank Stadium.

Howe is 15-3 in their last 18 games going back to 10/17/2014 vs. Tom Bean. Howe's best 18-game stetch was a 17-1 stretch from 11/3/1944-11/2/1946. Captain William Jesse McDonald

The Texas Rangers in its long history in the state has produced legendary figures in its quest to uphold the law. Captain William Jesse McDonald was one of many examples. McDonald's life had led him to serve at different times as a school teacher, shopkeeper, rancher, and eventually becoming one of the most respected law men bring order to the area. in Texas.

He was born in 1852 in eastern Mississippi. He was still a child when his father, Enoch McDonald, his fellow Rangers worked to volunteered to fight with the Confederacy during the Civil War. But in 1862, his father was killed at the Battle of Corinth. After, his widowed mother took them to Henderson County in East before forensics became a Texas.

He was stubborn from a young age. At the age of 16 in 1868, he reportedly got into a fight with Union troops and found himself charged with treason. Only the intervention of a prominent local officials resulted in the charges being dropped.

However, he had a keen mind and attended Soule Business College in New Orleans, graduating in 1872. He became a school teacher for a time before opening a couple of stores in East Texas. Later, he became a deputy sheriff in Wood County. In 1883, he and his wife moved to Wichita Falls to take up ranching.

They moved further west to Quanah several years later. Cattle thieves and organized gangs terrorized the few settlers in the area, hiding in the vast stretches of empty land. He became a deputy sheriff again, and as raids worsened, McDonald as made a special Texas Ranger, attacking marauders far and wide to finally

As a result, in 1891, he was named bodyguard for President Theodore captain of the Texas Rangers Frontier Battalion, where he and protect citizens from further raids and to act as the police for remote locations that had none. As a Ranger, he had a reputation as a keen observer and tracker. Long standard tool of law enforcement, McDonald was using the same principles in solving cases and capturing fugitives, an otherwise nearly impossible task on the seemingly endless stretches of land across the state in the late 1800s.

He found himself in many shootouts, including one with the sheriff of Childress County in 1893. Though shot on several occasions himself, he reportedly never took another life, but his skill with a gun and reputation preceded him and used it to defuse many difficult situations without a weapon.

In February 1896, McDonald solved a bank robbery in daring fashion. Bandits had seized \$600 at a bank in Wichita Falls, killed one man, and wounded another in a blaze of bullets in broad daylight. Within two hours of receiving the message on a train, he had arrived at the station, and ridden out of the city with a posse of five other Rangers in pursuit of the murderers. They charged through the brush on a blustery winter day and caught them within hours.

In 1905, he briefly served as a

Roosevelt. When he retired from the Rangers in 1907, he took a job as state revenue agent, ultimately collecting more than one billion dollars for Texas. In 1912, incoming President Woodrow Wilson also tapped McDonald as his personal bodyguard. In recognition of his work, Wilson named McDonald as United States Marshal for North Texas.

In early 1918, he died of pneumonia at his home in Wichita Falls. McDonald has since been inducted in the Texas Rangers Hall of Fame in Waco in recognition of his colorful life and unwavering dedication as a law man.
