With all of the thank yous that were dished out last week for the "Save the Church" event that raised the total up to \$25,000, I somehow forgot to mention the Howe Fire Department. I would like to sincerely apologize to the men and women of our great fire department because without the use of the facility and for the way they cleaned up before and after the event and helped out during the event - none of what we were able to do would have happened. So please, when you see the members of the Howe Fire Department, thank them for not only doing what they do to protect us but also for what they've been able to do to have a hand in the fundraising project.

What a great night it was on Thursday when I had a chance to broadcast with Lynn Burkhead for the first time in 12 years. Lynn introduced me to the broadcasting world of high school football back in 1994 when I became the sideline reporter for the Sherman Bearcats at 20-years-old. He and I later broadcast Denison games for five years together before I was transferred to McKinney ISD for play-by-play. It was a role reversal for us with me doing play-by-play and him color.

Games like Thursday night's 43-33 dramatic comeback win by Howe don't come along very often. As a matter of fact, the historical playoff record books cannot find any other situation where the Bulldogs came back from a depth of as many as 27 points to win a game and advance to the next round of the playoffs.

The Howe Bulldogs were left for dead with only 13:09 gone in the game trailing Edgwood (4-7) by a score of 27-0. But the 'Dogs dug deeper than the grave they were laying in and pushed themselves above the daisies and took their first lead of the night with 6:58 left in the third quarter. That means the

'Dogs spent the first 13 minutes giving away 27 points and then the next 22 minutes fighting to make up for it. The vast majority of teams that find themselves in that position just curl up and wait for death. But this

group of Bulldogs, now 10-1 on the season, have proved to their community and more importantly to themselves that when things go wrong, a little bit of never quit can be pulled

from the depths below the daisies.

Howe won the coin-toss and deferred to the second half and promptly booted an onside out of bounds

which gave Edgewood the ball with great field position to start the game. Four plays later, Edgewood's Tye Elie scored from the one yard line to give the opponent Bulldogs a 7-0 lead with only 52 seconds gone in the game.

Howe's first play of the game showed that the 'Dogs might have walked into the game either overconfident or very nervous. Quarterback Brandon Wall and center Clay Marshall fumbled the snap and Edgewood recovered at their own 46. Six plays later Edgewood quarterback Trey Erwin found David Davison in the corner of the endzone for the touchdown and Howe found themselves trailing 14-0 with 8:40 left in the first stanza.

Howe's next possession showed signs of life, but a costly personal foul on Howe led to a punt by Nick Wilson that went out of bounds and gave Edgewood another short field. Howe's defense started pressuring Erwin and forced a punt and all looked to be back on normal Howe Bulldog track, but Tyler Grisham tried to field the punt on a hop and fumbled the ball giving it back to Edgewood at the Howe 27 yard line. Moments later, Gerardo Moreno would carry the ball over from the 12 yard line and Howe, who couldn't catch a

break, trailed 21-0 with 2:47 left in the first quarter.

Just when things couldn't get worse, Howe drove 72 yards on 3:59 seconds, but couldn't get the last five yards as Moreno stripped the ball from Grisham to raced 95 yards uncontested to the opposite endzone. With a blocked PAT, Howe trailed 27-0 with 10:51 left in the second quarter.

Howe finally finished off a great drive on their next possession which started at their own 19 yard line and finished with a 7-yard touchdown by Grisham who needed second and third efforts to get the ball across. Howe cut the Edgewood lead to 27-7 with 4:55 left before half.

The Bulldogs defense started pressuring Erwin and Ty Portman, who recorded several sacks on the night knocked Edgewood into a punting situation which gave Howe the ball back at their own 47 yard line. Desperately needing a score before the half to regain some sense of normalcy going into the locker room, Howe quickly drove the needed yardage in only 1:20 and Grisham would score from an inch out after two half the distance penalties. Howe's touchdown

shrank Edgewood's lead to 27-14 with 1:09 left in the half. Howe was able to keep Edgewood off of the board in the final minute and the teams went to the break with Edgewood leading 27-14.

The Bulldogs of Howe got the ball to start the second half and needing to get on the board, did so by going 57 yards and ending it with a 14-yard touchdown by Wall, who got a tremendous block by fullback Jaden Matthews. Howe trailed 27-21 with 10:08 left in the third quarter.

Edgewood kept plugging away by starting at their own 32 yard line, but came up empty when Geno Dillard missed a 29-yard field goal attempt. Howe took over at their own 19 yard line.

Howe's large traveling crowd erupted when Wall faked the inside hand and escaped around the left side of the line and out ran all defenders on his way to game-tying 73-yard touchdown. Brice Honaker's PAT gave Howe their first lead of the night at 28-27 with 6:58 left in the third quarter.

Edgewood found a little "no quit" in them as well as they answered back with a 60-yard drive capped off by an Erwin to Trey King 23-yard touchdown pass. Edgewood regained the lead, 33-28 after missing the two-point conversion.

Howe's next possession would start

at their own 38 yard line with 4:37 in the third. Grisham went into punishing mode and carried the ball behind Tanner Hartsfield on more than one occasion. That combo would punch it across from the three and Howe took a 36-33 lead with :23 left in the third after Stratton Carroll added a two-point conversion as he raced untouched into the endzone.

As if Grisham hadn't already done enough to make up for the two early turnovers, he intercepted Erwin's pass near the endzone. Howe would capitalize by pulling of a patented Bulldog 67-yard, 6:06 drive that ended with a Carroll 15-yarder to up Howe's lead to 43-33 with 2:09 left in the game.

Nick Wilson virtually sealed Edgewood's hopes by intercepting Erwin and giving Howe the ball and a chance to just kneel down and kiss the ground that once housed their lifeless first quarter souls.

"I thought our kids, coaches, and fans had a belief Friday night." said Head Coach Zack Hudson. "We did just about everything we could to give them the game in the first quarter. With nine minutes to go in the second (quarter), our kids made a decision to start playing our style football and it showed. I felt that our coaches did a good job sticking to the game plan and letting the kids do what they are good at. Our kids showed great character and poise with a 27 to 0 deficit and understood

Lady Bulldogs start by beating 7th ranked 4A Melissa, 76-56

It was a big test early on for the Lady Bulldogs who come in ranked 21 in the state in the preseason polls by Texas Association of Basketball Coaches. The same poll has Melissa ranked 7 in Class 4A. Facing teams that are better than you always make you better in the long-run. But finding a team like that might be a little tough for Howe who has their eyes on the state tournament.

"I'm ready to go." said Head Coach Derek Lands. "If we'll stay healthy, I think we'll be alright."

The girls started out better than

alright by forcing Melissa to just 18 for 52 shooting from the field. Meanwhile, Howe shot 24 of 48 on their way to the 76-56 win. The Lady Bulldogs' sharp shooter Darci Foster knocked down three out of four three-pointers to finish second in points only to Howe's three-time District MVP Riley Harvey, who had 25 points and pulled down 15 rebounds.

"We really put it to Melissa, as Coach Lands would say." said Harvey. "I'm excited to see where it takes us. I think we can go as far as we want to and as hard as we work. If we keep working, we'll go

far."

Howe got off to a good start by leading Melissa 14-12 after the first period. Howe held the slimmest 21-20 lead going into the half but dominated the third quarter by outscoring Melissa, 22-9. The Lady Cardinals put up a fight in the final frame, but Howe still outscored them, 23-17 to reach the final 20 point margin of victory.

Lands had 13 different girls score at least one point in the contest. Just under Harvey and Foster was sophomore Peyton Streetman, who knocked down eight points, all from the free-throw line. Kayla Anderson chipped in six points and five rebounds.

Other scorers were Madisyn Hargron (5), Landry Rhoten (5), Payton Griffin (4), Kamryn Fulenchek (4), Holly Hawkins (2), Jaylyn Mosse (2), Hunter Brockleman (2), Kaity Helpenstell, and Alissa Smith with one each.

The girls will travel to Whitewright next Tuesday night to face the Lady Tigers.

Faith

Selfishness is one sign of immaturity. Babies are completely self-centered. They scream if they don't get what they want when they want it. All they are aware of are their own needs and desires. They can't say thanks for anything. They can't help others; they can't give anything. They can only receive. There's nothing wrong with that when it occurs in the natural stage of infancy but to see a child whose development is arrested so that they never get beyond that stage of helpless selfishness is a tragedy.

That is the spiritual state of many in the church today. They are preoccupied with self. They want their problems solved and their comfort level met. They're spiritually under developed, and they remain in a continuous state of helplessness. This is as tragic as a baby that never matures mentally. Just as a baby crawls along the floor, putting anything it finds in its mouth, spiritual babies don't know what is good for them and what isn't. Immaturity and failure to be discerning go together.

Paul appealed to Christians repeatedly to grow up spiritually. In Ephesians 4:14-15 he wrote, "We are no longer to be children, tossed here and there by waves, and carried about by every wind of doctrine, by the trickery of men, by craftiness in deceitful scheming; but speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in all

aspects into Him, who is the head, even Christ."

You grow spiritually by mature Christians "speaking the truth in love" to you and studying the truth of God's Word and allowing it to change your thoughts. As you absorb the truth of God's Word, you grow and are built up in confidence of who you are in Him. That process of spiritual growth is also a process of training for discernment.

"Though by this time you ought to be teachers, you have need again for someone to teach you the elementary principles of the truths of God, and you have come to need milk and not solid food. For everyone who partakes only of milk is not accustomed to the word of righteousness, for he is a babe. But solid food is for the mature, who because of practice have their senses trained to discern good and evil. Therefore leaving the elementary teaching about the Christ, let us press on to maturity," Hebrews 5:12-6:1.

The writer of Hebrews was telling his readers, "You're babies. You've been around long enough to be teachers, but instead I have to feed you milk. I have to keep giving you elementary things. You can't take solid food. You're not accustomed to the rich things of the Word—and that is tragic."

Knowing and understanding the Word of God trains your senses to discern good and evil.

Discernment results from a carefully disciplined mind to take your thoughts captive and to make sure they match up to what the Truth in God's word is. Discernment is not a matter of feelings. The Old Testament closely linked discernment with a seasoned, developed, biblically informed mind.

Most people are discerning about things that are important to them. People who regard a healthy diet as crucial watch carefully what they eat. They read the fine print on the package to see how many grams of fat it has and what percentage of the daily required nutrients it offers. People who work with dangerous chemicals must be very discerning. They study the procedures and the precautions very carefully to avoid any potentially lethal exposure. I know people who are very discerning sports enthusiasts. They watch a football game and can assess any offense, any defense, any play. They often feel they are more

discerning than whoever is calling the actual plays. They study statistics and averages and take it all very seriously.

Did you realize those are essentially the same mature skills that are required in spiritual discernment? Careful thought, keen interest, thorough analysis, close observation—together with alertness, attentiveness, thoughtfulness, and above all, a love of truth. We use maturity and discernment in whatever field of endeavor is important to us. Yet what could be more important than spiritual discernment? There is no valid excuse for contemporary Christians to be tolerant of what God calls sin - it reveals a spiritual apathy that is deadly evil. Tolerance is only a virtue to a man with no conviction. The church needs to regain its ability to be discerning by growing up spiritually. That means confronting the ungodly views this culture has adopted and diligently apply yourself to the unfailing Word of God. You are in this world to be different. You

cannot be a light in the darkness of this world if you don't think differently than the world thinks. The need to tolerate suggests that there is a disagreement. Jesus confronted sin in love. He never accepted it as healthy. The acceptance of wrong gives it the strength to grow. A discerning spirit will not accept sin to be right.

You can't gain the maturity of discernment overnight, or through a mystical experience. Maturity is gained through walking out your Christianity, just as we learned to walk as toddlers by getting up and falling down. Don't stay down. Learn about antiques and collectibles with Georgia Caraway



Sewing implements are sought after by many collectors and include all sorts of items including buttons, scissors, thimbles, darning needles, thread, needlebooks, measuring tapes, and button bags. These rare small drawstring bags are the kind of accessory items that sewing collectors covet. The cotton fabric in the two examples shown in the picture appears to be from the 19th century, but the style of embroidered wording is mid-1920s. These bags were offered as kits in various designs and shapes through needle working magazines such as Needlecraft Magazine or The Young Ladies Journal.

A charming one we have has the embroidered words "The Button Family" and has members of the family like mother, father, children, and even the family cat, all with heads and bodies made using bone underwear buttons.

Underwear buttons traditionally have two large holes that make them ideal for depicting eyes. Most button heads were hand painted, however, in some examples the heavy thread they were attached with gave them their colorful eyes.

The owl bag is especially charming with its legend of "All kinds of owl buttons in here." It would be fun for a button collector to fill that bag with buttons depicting owls. Vintage owl buttons, however, are not easy to find.

These bags were most likely used for storing sewing and mending supplies—cloth and yarn on the inside and thimbles and thread in the outside pockets.

Needlework bags have been valued in the \$75 to \$175 range depending on design with the owl bag being in the lower range and the pocket-style with the children playing games valued in the upper range.

In thirty-five years of collecting, I have only found these two little bags. I am taking my own wise suggestion to heart and am now searching for owl buttons to fill my owl bag!

that the game was still in reach and we just needed to play smarter. As coaches, this type of comeback will only happen a handful of times in an entire career and for it to happen on this type of stage says a lot about the character and belief that these players have and showed. There is a cheer that one of our students starts and it says "I believe that we will win" and that truly painted the picture for the final two and a half quarters when our Bulldogs went on a 43-6 run. The hardest thing in life to do is to stand up and fight when your back is against the wall and no one will ever question that about these young men."

Howe has won six games in a row which is best since 1998. The

longest streak is 14 back from 1938-39.

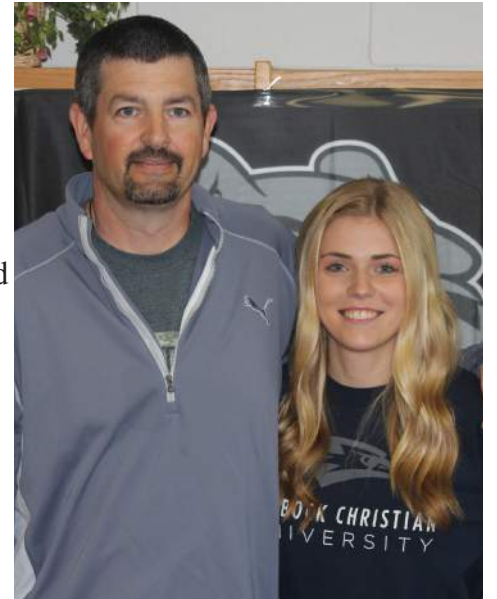
At the moment, Foster has no intention of playing basketball for LCU, but one might never know, seeing how she was initially stopped by the basketball coach.

Captain William Jesse McDonald

The Texas Rangers in its long history in the state has produced legendary figures in its quest to uphold the law. Captain William Jesse McDonald was one of many examples. McDonald's life had led him to serve at different times as a school teacher, shopkeeper, rancher, and eventually becoming one of the most respected law men in Texas.

He was born in 1852 in eastern Mississippi. He was still a child when his father, Enoch McDonald, volunteered to fight with the Confederacy during the Civil War. But in 1862, his father was killed at the Battle of Corinth. After, his widowed mother took them to Henderson County in East Texas.

He was stubborn from a young age. At the age of 16 in 1868, he reportedly got into a fight with Union troops and found himself charged with treason. Only the intervention of a prominent local officials resulted in the charges being dropped.

However, he had a keen mind and attended Soule Business College in New Orleans, graduating in 1872. He became a school teacher for a time before opening a couple of stores in East Texas. Later, he became a deputy sheriff in Wood County. In 1883, he and his wife moved to Wichita Falls to take up ranching.

They moved further west to Quanah several years later. Cattle thieves and organized gangs terrorized the few settlers in the area, hiding in the vast stretches of empty land. He became a deputy sheriff again, and as raids worsened, McDonald as made a special Texas Ranger, attacking marauders far and wide to finally bring order to the area.

As a result, in 1891, he was named captain of the Texas Rangers Frontier Battalion, where he and his fellow Rangers worked to protect citizens from further raids and to act as the police for remote locations that had none. As a Ranger, he had a reputation as a keen observer and tracker. Long before forensics became a standard tool of law enforcement, McDonald was using the same principles in solving cases and capturing fugitives, an otherwise nearly impossible task on the seemingly endless stretches of land across the state in the late 1800s.

He found himself in many shootouts, including one with the

sheriff of Childress County in 1893. Though shot on several occasions himself, he reportedly never took another life, but his skill with a gun and reputation preceded him and used it to defuse many difficult situations without a weapon.

In February 1896, McDonald solved a bank robbery in daring fashion. Bandits had seized \$600 at a bank in Wichita Falls, killed one man, and wounded another in a blaze of bullets in broad daylight. Within two hours of receiving the message on a train, he had arrived at the station, and ridden out of the city with a posse of five other Rangers in pursuit of the murderers. They charged through the brush on a blustery winter day and caught them within hours.

In 1905, he briefly served as a bodyguard for President Theodore

Roosevelt. When he retired from the Rangers in 1907, he took a job as state revenue agent, ultimately collecting more than one billion dollars for Texas. In 1912, incoming President Woodrow Wilson also tapped McDonald as his personal bodyguard. In recognition of his work, Wilson named McDonald as United States Marshal for North Texas.

In early 1918, he died of pneumonia at his home in Wichita Falls. McDonald has since been inducted in the Texas Rangers Hall of Fame in Waco in recognition of his colorful life and unwavering dedication as a law man.


