Lady Bulldogs to participate in 58th Annual Whataburger Tournament

FORT WORTH, Texas – The Whataburger Basketball Tournament, hailed by USA Today and Sports Illustrated as one of the nation's top holiday tournaments, returns to the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex for its 58th year.

The three-day tournament takes place Monday, Dec. 28 through Wednesday, Dec. 30, at three venues. The 5,000-seat Birdville Independent School District's W.G. Thomas Coliseum will host the highpowered Orange Division, the 1,700

-seat Chisholm Trail High School arena will host the Boys Blue Division and the 2,200-seat Saginaw High School arena will host the Girls Blue Division. More than 30,000 fans and spectators are expected to attend.

The tournament began in 1957 with a competition between only eight teams. Today, the tournament has become a nationally acclaimed competition with college scouts and coaches in

Howe's week of basketball started with a win on the road in Bonham on Tuesday night by a score of 47-38. The game was a tight one for the most part, but a third period that saw Howe outscore the Warriors, 18-13 gave the 'Dogs enough cushion to use the final period to close it out.

Sam Akins and Michael Kerher each scored 14 to lead Howe. The two combined for five threepointers and Nick Wilson added three of his own three-pointers and finished with 11 points. Levi Mrozinski added five points while Griffin Underwood had a threepointer. All five starters had at least

one three-pointer in the game.

On Thursday, the Bulldogs entered the Princeton tournament and started with a win over Canyon Creek Christian Academy, 46-34. Howe led at the half, 19-17 after trailing 10-8 after the first period. The Bulldogs ripped 17 points in the third period to seal the would-be victory.

The 'Dogs would then take on tournament host Princeton on Friday night and Akins electrified the crowd with a last-second flying layup to tie the game with ten seconds left. He was also fouled on the shot and made his free throw for the dramatic 37-36 win in comefrom-behind fashion as Howe trailed by 10 at one point in the fourth quarter.

City of Howe hits \$300k in sales tax for first time



Shop Local campaign has helped Howe's revenue

In a year that saw Howe restart its chamber of commerce, hire a fulltime economic development president, land three new retail businesses and a new apartment complex, the State Comptroller Glen Hegar revealed that Howe has eclipsed the previous high in sales tax with a 2015 total of \$308,689.11 which is up 12.44 percent equating to \$34,163.72 from 2014's total of \$274,525.39.

The 2014 total was the previous high of any year since the 1992 recordings. The largest jump from one year to the next happened from 1997 to 1998 when the revenue increased by \$51,212.86. That year's increase was due to the adoption of the 4B sales tax funding, therefore making this year's increase the largest jump with all things equal.

Howe's 12.44 percent change ranks the city 265 out of 1152 Texas communities. In comparison to other surrounding communities, Van Alstyne increased 8.27 percent, Anna increased 7.25 percent, Denison increased 4.45 percent and Sherman increased 2.10 percent.

By percentage growth in sales tax revenue, Howe compares to nearby communities of Princeton, 12.61 percent; Wylie 12.82 percent; Leonard 13.34 percent and Whitewright, 13.47 percent. Howe and Whitewright's sales tax revenue numbers are nearly identical on a monthly revenue basis and a year-end total. The total of \$309,799.20 shows an increase for Whitewright above their \$273,020.36 from 2014. However, Whitewright is just now coming back after a massive fall off of \$420,888.59 total in 2011 to \$271,629.03 in 2012.

"This is only the beginning of what will be an economic transformation of Howe." says Howe's President of Economic Development. "Being located on US 75 gives us a great opportunity in the next 10 years to go from this new accomplished goal of \$300,000 to \$1,000,000 by 2025. I really feel like we are on track and can look 14 miles to the south to back up those goals." Anna went from \$353,781 in 2005 to \$1,472,317 in 2015.



"While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped Him in cloths and placed Him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn," Luke 2:6-7.

Learn about antiques and collectibles with Georgia Caraway

Christmas greetings cards are becoming more popular as a collectible category. They may come in the form of a postcard greeting or as a multi-fold greeting card. Henry Cole is credited with being the originator of the

greeting card industry. In 1843, he commissioned an artist friend, John Calcott Horsley, to design a card that could be mailed in an envelope to friends, relatives and business associates. Queen Victoria, helped establish the holiday and special-occasion card in Great Britain and the United States. Louis Prang became the foremost greeting card maker in the U.S. when he introduced the Christmas card in 1875. The company manufactured nearly 5 million Christmas cards each year.

John C. Hall and his brothers opened the first Hallmark card shop in Kansas City in 1914. He predicted that sending cards would become a social custom conveying that the sender cares about the recipient. Even in light of the advent of email cards, more than half of the first-class mail sent in the United States is still greeting cards.

Several books about greeting cards have been published: The Very Best from Hallmark: Greeting Cards through the Years (Abrams, 1988), The Romance of Greeting Cards (Chase, 1971), The History of the Christmas Card (Buday, 1954), and Greeting Card Design (Fink, 1992).

My friends have become used to receiving greetings cards from me from the 1940s and 50s with slightly yellowed envelopes. A few years ago a friend of mine who had shopped one of my garage sales and

bought a box of used cards for \$3, sent one back to me with a computer-printed sticker affixed inside explaining it was a vintage card from our sale. They had carefully struck through the signature of the original sender and signed their names. I usually recycle Christmas cards after the season is over, but I can assure you that I added their card to my collection of vintage cards.

So, if you care enough to send the very best, send a vintage card, yellowed envelope and all. Just be sure it arrives in the Nick of time.



The Texas Minute: Oil legend H. L. Hunt

"Money is just a way of keeping score," oil baron H. L. Hunt was once reported to have said. H. L. Hunt kept score, counted cards, and had a relentless appetite for anything he saw in one of the most games that included stakes in the unusual rags-to-riches stories in the history of American business.

Haroldson Lamar Hunt, Jr., was born in Ramsey, a small farm community in southern Illinois, in 1889. He was the youngest of eight children. His father, Haroldson Hunt, Sr., was a farmer, parlaying investments from oil and all the entire family worked full-time to support the farm. His mother, Ella, taught the children at would become a business empire. home, and Hunt had very little formal schooling. At the age of 16, he left home and started exploring the West, taking a series of odd jobs along the way, including lumberjack and mule skinner.

He had a talent for math and turned to gambling. He made it to built an august three-story Arkansas by 1910, and after his father's death, he used his inheritance and bought a cotton plantation in Chicot County. He married Lyda Bunker in 1914. By his oil holdings, drilling more the early 1920s, facing ruin from a wells in southern Arkansas and series of floods, Hunt moved to nearby El Dorado, which was in the midst of an oil boom that was producing incredible fortunes and East Texas.

bringing in swarms of prospectors.

While he had seven children with wife Lyda Bunker of Lake Village, he was not a devoted family man. He carried on torrid affairs with at least two other women, having eight known children with his mistresses.

According to several stories, nearly broke, Hunt gambled his last dollars in a series of poker games in the notorious "Hamburger Row" area of El Dorado, an area known at the time for speakeasies, greasy spoons, and houses of prostitution. Hunt ended up winning a fortune in lucrative oil fields of South Arkansas. One turn of the cards made the difference between riches and ruin.

From these developing leases, he formed partnerships with businessmen in the area and began sales and began brokering oil leases, steadily building what Eventually, he had 44 producing wells in South Arkansas and sold a stake in 40 wells in 1924 for \$600,000 (more than \$8.1 million in 2015 dollars). By 1925, the once nearly-bankrupt cotton farmer was now a millionaire and had bought out an entire city block in downtown El Dorado where he

At this point, he was approached by Columbus M. "Dad" Joiner, who owned a small farm in Rusk County, Texas. Joiner had been attempting to find investors for his claims. Hunt learned that there were problems with Joiner's legal claims to the oil and that he was deeply in debt. Convinced there was oil, Hunt gambled again. Hunt bought the oil leases for \$30,000 in cash, secured mostly from an El Dorado investor, and promised Joiner up to \$1.2 million when oil was found. Hunt promised to protect Joiner from any lawsuits or legal action regarding the claims. The field paid off beyond his wildest dreams.

In 1932, Hunt moved his family and his headquarters to Tyler, Texas. He began drilling more wells and buying local refineries. The East Texas oil fields would make Hunt not only a billionaire but the richest man in the world
