## Flood Prevention Structures Curb Water Damage



This is a picture taken several years ago east of Van Alstyne on FM 121. Bob Arbelger, District Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, says this is a rare sight today due to flood prevention lakes guarding the watersheds.

These FP structures prevent floods, protect streams and lakes from sediment pollution, prevent damage to roads and bridges and furnish fishing and recreation.

Mr. Arbelger says structure maintenance is as important as the maintenance of a car, truck or piece of valuable machinery. The Upper Elm Red and Collins Soil and Water Conservation Districts have operation and main-

tenance responsibilities of structures in this area. The County Commissioners Court has assumed the responsibility of maintenance and repair. The structures are inspected at least once annually to determine maintenance and repair needs.

Mr. Arbelger reports that Cliff Hestand, Commissioner Precinct 1, Grayson County, has just finished maintenance and repair of two FP structures on Starvo Grove Watershed. Besides repairs, the Commissioners Courts pay the expense of weed control if needed. The expense of maintenance and repair of the structures is only a fraction of the cost of road and bridge repairs that is saved.

Mr. Arbelger reports that every structure in the Van Alstyne Water Unit Area will be inspected in the next two months. Structures in the IER SWCD will be inspected by Harold Staggs, District Director, and those in the Collins SWCD will be inspected by J.W. Hynds, District Director. They will be assisted by appropriate county commissioners.

Mr. Arbelger points out that any problem or repair needed on a structure should be reported to the Soil and Water Conservation District or the Soil Conservation Service. This assistance by the public will be greatly appreciated.

## 4-H MEMBERS TO CANVASS FRIDAY FOR MARCH OF DIMES

The Howe 4-H Club members will make a household house canvass in Howe for the March of Dimes on Friday, January 22, from 4 p. m. to 6 p. m. Mrs. James L. Nelson will direct the club members in the drive. Funds are to be used for research in fighting dread diseases and birth defect. This is only one of many services the 4-H Club has provided for our community.

## February Draft Call Up 280 Men

Col. Melvin N. Glantz, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas, announced the February draft call for Texas today. The state will induct 1185 men, and all will be called from the Extended Priority Selection Group and the First Priority Selection Group for 1971.

Glantz explained that the Extended Priority Group includes all selective service registrants who were classified in Class I-A, I-A-O, or I-O on Dec. 31, 1970 and whose lottery number was reached by their local boards in ordering men for induction in 1970, but who, for one reason or another, were not ordered to report for induction. This group is made up of registrants who were born between 1944 and 1950 and who have not reached their 26th birthday.

The State Director emphasized that local boards will call men from the 1971 First Priority Selection Group only if the call cannot be filled with men from the Extended Priority Selection Group.

Col. Glantz further explained that the 1971 First Priority Group is made up of registrants born in calendar year 1951 who are currently classified in Class I-A, I-A-O or I-O.

Glantz noted that the February call of 1185 men is up from the January call, which was 900 men from Texas. The national call for February is 17,000 men, all for the Army. Local boards in Texas are ordering 3377 men to take their pre-induction physical examinations in February.
