Every year the nation observes the Scout Week in observance of the founding of the Boy Scouts of America 60 years ago. This year, 4, 6 million Boy Scouts and their 1, 6 million adult leaders will observe the founding of Scouts under a new banner. Instead of Boy Scouts there will be Scouts to be a Boy Scout of America Anniversary Celebration during the month of February.

Presently, one out-of-four boys of Scout age is a member of the Boy Scouts of America, and through a new language development plan, called B.P. 776, the Boy Scouts plan to involve a representative one third of all boys in the Scouting program. Parents are missing a bet when they overlook the good work of the Scouts. The age of Scouting begins at eight years and extends through 17. The eight-year-old can enroll in the Cub Scouts, when a young scout reaches 11 years of age, he can become a full-fledged Boy Scout and participate in vigorous outdoor programs to teach boys concepts of honor; duty to God and country; service to others; and self-respect.

The Boy Scout organization had its inception on July 26, 1907, as a small group of boys and two men set up a camp in a sheltered bay on an island off England's southern coast. The group was led by Lord Baden-Powell, a British hero of the Boer War, and his boys were from the streets of England's cities—and from the most remote slative schools. Two years later, Boy Scouting came to the United States when Mr. William D. Boyce, a Chicago newspaper and magazine publisher, inspired by his acquaintanceship with Scouting in England, incorporated on February 8, 1909, the Boy Scouts of America in Washington, D. C. A Federal Charter from Congress was granted on Feb. 12, 1910. Today we owe a debt of gratitude to the vision of Lord Baden-Powell and to William D. Boyce. There is no better way of expressing that gratitude by funding the cause of the Scouts at every opportunity during the month of February.

## Construction Begins Here On New Westgate Mobile Home Park

Ground work and foundation construction for a recreation building were begun here recently by developer of the proposed Westgate Mobile Home Park, located on a 20-acre site in North Howe. Heavy equipment was moved to the site about two weeks ago, with the project estimated at about four months for completion, according to a representative of the developers, Club Jones, Architect for the project at Dug Grogan's.

The site is located between Highway 5 and an expressway with frontage of 442 feet on Highway 76 and 374 feet bordering Highway 8. Jones and Grogan said "The development will be one of the finest in the State of Texas." Plans submitted to the Planning and Zoning Commission for the mobile homes will have averaging 880 square feet. Requirements call for solid foundations, climate honors, air conditioning covers, off street parking for two automobiles at each site, and 16" TV service, underground utilities, and paved streets with

curb and gutter. Facilities will also include a swimming pool for residents of the park, play area complete with equipment laundry facilities and a boat storage area, a masonry and panel fence fronting on Highway 75 is included in the plans.

Council recently issued a \$347,000 building permit for the construction of the project.

## Howe, Sherman City Limit Line Established

The cities of Howe and Sherman reached an agreement on city limit boundaries Tuesday night in a joint meeting of the two governing bodies. The agreement was signed at the city hall.

The Councils and mayors had met on previous occasions during the past month in an effort to settle the dispute, in view of a proposed manufacturing plant occupying the Gagnon County Coliseum building.
