COLISEUM TO HOUSE NEW INDUSTRIAL PLANT

Plans for a new industry to occupy the Grayson County Coliseum here were outlined Thursday morning at a breakfast meeting held at the Ramada Inn. Workmen last week began removing the bleachers in preparation for an installation of a concrete floor and other changes to meet the needs of the company.

Judge David H. Brown and Joe Kaufmann of Sherman purchased the property at an undisclosed price and leased it to Magna-Fab Southwest Inc., a division of Magna-Power Inc. of Wooster, Ohio, builder of metal products.

Don Collier was introduced as the executive vice president and general manager of the firm, which he said would be in production within the next 30 days.

"We should start with around 25 employees," Collier said. "I'm bringing five men down from Wooster. In fact, they left to day with a truck load of equipment."

Collier said 10,000 of the 23,000 square feet in the building will be utilized by a highly sophisticated painting setup. "Our products will come out with the same type finish as an auto," said Collier, who spent 32 years with General Motors before breaking away and creating the parent company of the firm he now represents.

The new Howe plant is being financed with a \$300,000 debenture issue which Collier said was quickly gobbled by stockholders of the parent firm.

"We anticipate utilizing about \$100,000 in getting set up at Howe, and will have the balance for either expansion of initial contingencies, he said.

The firm will not start hiring until they are ready to initiate production in May. "We'll use basically male employees at first," Collier said, "but we'll have women operators, press break operators and punch press operators, he said.

One of the contracts the firm hopes to open with is to build cars for a new equipment turned out by Le Tourneau at Longview. Then they have contracts with Western Electric for specialized metal boxes with tolerances of from

1,000 to 2,000 th of an inch. Brown said the plant was made possible by the cooperation of Howe and Sherman city officials, who have been squabbling over the boundary line involving the coliseum property.

"We're delighted to have the new firm in Howe," said Wortham, "and pledge the full support of the city to its progress."

Water Registration Period Extended

County Tax Officer George Schumacher received official notice Friday from the Secretary of State that voter registration had been extended from the traditional Jan. 31 deadline until Feb. 28.

"This was the bill that Gov. Preston Smith, mailed at the press over coverage of the insurance stock suit, signed Friday at Austk with news representative barred.

He believes, however, that the final figure will be ahead of last year's approximately 29,000.

While a number of young persons were registered, there was no real rush, as the 18 to 20-year group to enroll as voters in Grayson County, Sept. 1969, is optimistic about the extension of the registration period.

Only about one-half of one per cent of the graduating seniors in the United States receive the honor.

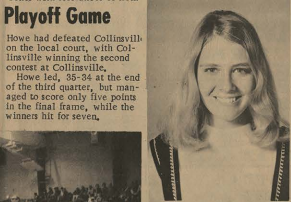

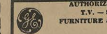
Jackie Shaw Meeting Held At Baptist Church

Savoy Unit Part Of Record TP&L Expansion Cast

Texas Power & Light Co. will spend \$104,250,000 for the construction of two new facilities in 1971. T. L. Austin, Jr., TP&L president, announced.

The construction budget is the largest in the company's 30-year history, and expenditures will grow TP&L to keep pace with the growing electrical demands in its 35-county service area.

A major portion of the program is involved in the construction of seven major generating units. When completed over the next several years, the new units will be capable of producing more than 2 million kilowatts of electric energy.

One new unit is located on the Red River. Two units on the third unit near Savoy in Texas. Three units will be installed in Prewitt County and Texas County and a generating unit in Hood County.

The Prewitt County and Texas County units will be owned jointly by TP&L, Dallas Power & Light Company and Texas Electric Service Company. In addition to its power plant construction, the Company will build or improve transmission lines in 23 of its 35 counties and distribution lines and service centers in various parts of its service area.
