Delinquent Taxes Candidates File To Be Handled By For City Council, City Attorney School Board

Delinquent city taxes are to be turned over to an attorney for collection, City Council members voted Tuesday night. Delinquents of any duration will be processed during the attorney in an effort to clear tax records, council decided.

In other action, members voted to contract an engineer for specifications for a new sewer line to the Grayson County Coliseum building, which will house a new industry here following renovations.

Approved installation of a new six-inch water main along Highway 76 from the new trailer park to the Coliseum property, with stub-outs in front of each residence along the highway. Residences have previously been served by a two-inch line. Next regular meeting of the council is scheduled Monday, March 1.

Placing their names on the list were Duana Roberts, owner of Duane's Body Shop here and incumbent Jimmy Don McMillion, filling earlier for the Mayor's office was Price Hanning. Two seats are to be filled on council, with the term of Oweyon Jay expiring this year. Also open is the Municipal Judge's slot.

Filing for school board was Ms. Shirley Melton. Terms expires are those of Dr. Ned Culp and Bill Murdock. Both elections are scheduled Saturday, April 3.

DORCHESER VOTE ON INCORPORATION SET

Dorcheser voters will have an opportunity March 13 to vote on incorporating the West Grayson County town, following and application filed with signatures of more than 20 electors Tuesday. The voting will be held from 7:00 a.

Several Western Hill residents, however, were present and in opposition to the construction, including Darrell Wininger, David King, Jim Harrah, Mr. and Mrs. Jim Feck and James Drexler. Wins Betty Crocker Award Here

Cathy L. Powell has been named 1971 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow for Howe High School. She was chosen on the basis of her score in a Dec. 1 written knowledge and attitude examination for which 850, 000 senior girls throughout the country were enrolled. From General Mills sponsor of the annual education program, she will receive a specially designed award. Additionally, her selection makes her eligible for state and national honors, including one of 102 college scholarships totaling \$10, 000.

The 1971 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow -- the national winner -- will be awarded a \$5, 000 educational grant. She will be selected this spring from all senior girls representing each state and the District of Columbia during an expense-paid educational tour by these State Homemakers of Tomorrow -- each accompanied by a school adviser -- of Washington D. C., and Colonial Williamsburg, Va. Seniors, third- and fourth place winners nationally will receive \$4, 000, \$3, 000 and \$2, 000 scholarships. The other state winners will be awarded \$1, 500 grants.

In addition to the awards for school, state and national Homemakers of Tomorrow, second-ranking girls in each state receive \$500 scholarships, and schools of State Homemakers of Tomorrow are awarded complete sets of Encyclopaedia Britannica by Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc. All judging and selection of winners is done by Science Research Associates, Chicago, which also constructed and grades the written examination.

The only national scholarship program exclusively for high school senior girls, the Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow was instituted by General Mills in the 1954-55 school year to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career. Since its inception, almost seven and three-quarter million girls have been enrolled, and, with this year's grants, scholarship awards will total in excess of \$1 3/4 million.
