TORNADO DAMAGE HEAVY

Howe was virtually evacuated last Friday night as several tornadoes touched down in the area immediately to the north of town. Heavy damage was reported by several farmers and ranchers near here, while other twisters completely destroyed the Mt. Carmel Baptist Church between Gunter and Tioga, caused heavy damage at Achille, Okla., in the Willis area of Lake Texoma, and points in between.

The L. W. Coleman place on Highway 902 took the first brunt of the twisters, with a garage completely destroyed and the roof blown off the house. Roof damage was also heavy the roof of Coleman's barn, Mr. and Mrs. Coleman were in their home when the twister struck. Windows were also blown out of the house.

The twister approached the ground closer to town, as uprooted trees and other signs of the force could be seen.

Howe residents evacuated homes and businesses, most of them going south of Highway 78, as the first twister was sighted southwest of town. Several twisters were sighted between the hours of 5:00 p.m. and 6:30.

One family narrowly escaped with their lives as the twister continued in Northwest course. The J. L. Owen property just north of 902 was almost completely destroyed. One of the Owen's children sounded the alarm to the other family members, who retreated to the basement of the home. The twister destroyed the Owen's barn, garage with an apartment, house, and heavily damaged the family car and a pickup truck.

Furniture, bedding, and other household items were sucked through a picture window after the glass had been broken by the storm. A mattress in one bedroom disappeared through the opening and was found later about a mile away. Fencing was also torn from the walls, although actual framework of the home remained intact. Hair and other debris was deposited throughout the home. A refrigerated air conditioning unit was found inside the home, with the framework for the unit intact in the window where it had been installed. A steel trailer was lifted about 200 yds into a pasture. Trees along the roadway leading to the home were uprooted, blocking off the road.

Path of the destructive twister could be traced for several miles, with garages, barns and other buildings either heavily

damaged or completely destroyed.

Evidence of the tornado was visible north of the railroad near Highway 1417. An unoccupied home north of the L. L. Owens property was completely destroyed, with a barn heavily damaged. A two-wheel fertilizer spreader was found in the top of a tree near where the house had been. Path of the twister could be traced easily by the uprooted trees, tin and other materials deposited throughout the area.

Several saddles and other material was reported stolen following the storm. A guard at the Texas Instruments plant reported he entered the area immediately after the storm to check damage to the company's radio tower, which was destroyed, and noticed several saddles near the roadway. Upon returning shortly, the saddles were gone. A Pickup truck was observed in the area at the time. Officers reported other looting Sunday.

James L. Davis, who lives in the area where the twister first touched down, said the funnel sucked water from a nearby stock tank, depositing it during its Northwestly course.

Hail damage to autos was reported in the vicinity of the Johnson & Johnson plant.

Students Assist In Evaluation Program

As part of the evaluation program of the community profile committee obtained these results from the High School Students. The questionnaire is being filled out by all students in the Howe Independent School District.

88 1/2 % of all parents in this school district completed High School. Of the fathers that did not complete elementary school, 11.5 % of the fathers did not, and only 2 1/2 % of the mothers did not. 56% of the parents completed high school, that leaves 44% of the parents in this community do not have a high school education.

28.7% of the fathers attend college while 12% graduated from college. 15% of the mothers attended college, but only 8% completed college. 27.7% of the fathers had attended a technical school.

When the students were asked if their parents wanted them to complete high school, 88% responded positively, but approximately 12% of the parents were not concerned.

77.5% of the parents want their children to attend college. So far without the tabulation from the elementary and junior high school, any evaluation would be biased and maybe not typical of this community. But, as far as the percentage goes now, Howe is neither blessed or deprived of an educational background.
