Evaluations Continue At Junior High, Elementary Schools

Present phase of the Howe School Evaluation program was derived from the parents of students in the Junior High and Elementary schools. The evaluation is still not complete in that only 140 have been returned. There is somewhat of an increase in the education of the parents represented in the lower grades. There was a 97 percent completion of Elementary school compared to 88 percent completion of parents who have students in high school. Contract Let For Sewer Extension To Coliseum

Contract for installation of sewer facilities to the Grayson County Coliseum building was awarded Thursday night to Sheitenberger, Inc., Sherman. The firm was low bidder on the project, setting the cost at \$120,750. Sixty calendar days was allotted for construction, beginning with issuance of a work order by the city. Other bids submitted were: Cole and Smith Construction Co., \$15,719.94. M & H Construction Co., \$14,441.20. Welch Construction Co. \$14,833.80.

System is being installed to service the building, which has been leased by Magni-Fab Inc for a manufacturing plant.

Council also approved two plats, one submitted previously by J. W. Reed and M. B. Swanner for an apartment complex on Hanning Street and Western Hills Drive, and a 16-ot addition to Southern Heights in South Howe. The letters, owned by Bill Mayo, extended Maple and Sunset Streets for one block. Plans call for facilities in accordance with city building codes. Mayor Doug Workman told council members that the Kim Bell property near the railroad was due for a facilitating. Owners of that property have been contacted, and agreed to the cleanup.

Contour Gardening Controls Erosion

A wise gardener can make good use of one of the oldest and most widely used methods of terracing slopes, by contour gardening. This is done by creating a series of terraces or steps across the slope, which will hold the soil in place and prevent erosion. The terraces are built by digging a series of shallow trenches across the slope. These trenches will catch the runoff water and prevent it from washing away the soil. The terraces can be built on a steep slope, or on a gentle slope. They can be built in a straight line, or in a curve. They can be built with a single row of plants, or with multiple rows. Contour gardening does not require any special skills or equipment. A contour line can be laid out by using a chain or rope. The level mounted on a tripod can be used to check the level of the terraces.

Our Neighbors

OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

Vandalism throughout the nation continues to be a roadblock against modern recreation facilities which could be made available to those who want to enjoy the great outdoors.

From Washington the American Forestry Institute recently issued a report on this subject covering a survey of 254 community-owned forest areas.

In 80 of the areas they found signs destroyed. In 58 trunks and trees were dumped at unauthorized places. There were 47 fires of company property; 36 improvement destructions; 31 forest fires started; 36 instances of killing and cutting trees; 29 gates destroyed; and many other illegal acts.

This destruction was on private property, where, through a corporate effort, the owners made the property available and even furnished facilities for recreation users.

Estimated cost of this vandalism was \$436,000.

AFS survey covered 65 million acres of land where public facilities were made available. Some at a slight charge. On this survey, 2,315 people, 1,832 companies and 2,315 picnic tables, all for use of the general public. Yet the public persisted in its destruction.

Vandalism continues to be one of the greatest factors in our recreation program. Vandals and litterbugs cause needless waste of millions of dollars in recreation money every year.

Our own Texas Highway Department has litter barrels every few miles along the state's highways. These are emptied daily.

Still there are literally thousands of pieces of tissue paper, beer bottles and soda pop bottles, beer cans and soda pop cans tossed along the highways. These are the major items, but there are others. Some drivers don't even worry about seeing that their discarded glass bottles do not fall on the highway.

Others toss their bottles in lakes and streams where people swim or fish.

Some "Scatterbrags" are the people who make it harder on those who want to enjoy the great outdoors. They should be reported, so that they may be taken into court and given whatever punishment is prescribed by law. Maximum fine is \$200.

As a result of vandalism and littering, many of the companies owning forests lands now are charging fees for their use. More will do so if the littering and breaking continues. This is to help take care of such needless expenses.

Naturally whatever is spent for repair and replacement as well as "housekeeping" comes out of funds appropriated for improvements. So it behooves those of us who want more parks, more boat launching ramps, more lakes and more recreation to report those who violate and vandalize. Texas has experienced much vandalism. Even its new state parks and sometimes the roadside parks along the highways are badly damaged.

Highway department trucks are busy every day picking up bottles and papers that have been strewn along otherwise beautiful roads by litterbugs. Just by outdoors we can destroy the very outdoors we want to enjoy.

It's time to quit saying you don't want to get involved and start lending a hand to those who help to enforce our laws. The least we can do is report the violators.

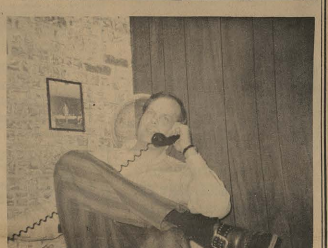

TAXPAYERS ASK IRS

Q: Will any IRS office compute my tax for me?

A: No. The IRS regional director in Dallas says the returns are processed if you will have the IRS compute your tax, complete all the appropriate forms, and then mail it to IRS as you have to the IRS. It will then attach all necessary schedules. Only those who have \$50,000 or less income consisting of salaries, wages, dividends, interest, annuities and other income are eligible for this service. If you meet these requirements and are entitled to a refund or income credit, follow the instructions on the top of Schedule B, attach it to your return, and the credit will be computed by IRS.

New Conservation Program Announced

A new conservation program, the local Environmental Assistance Program (EAP), has been announced by C. M. Vetter, Chairman of the Oregon County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee. Mr. Vetter stated that the new program is a cost-sharing program of the U.S. Department of Agriculture under which farmers and the government share the cost of conservation practices needed in the public interest. Formerly known as the Agricultural Conservation Program, it has been restructured to better meet environmental goals benefiting farmers and their neighbors.

The new program is designed to give higher priority to those practices which result in significant public benefits and materially assist in the solution of community water pollution and conservation problems. A major thrust will be to reduce water pollution, water recharging measures on farms such as dams and ponds, permanent water control strips, riparian zone stream, streams, lakes and wetlands.

Cost shares are offered in various forms for the following types of projects: Reforestation, permanent vegetative cover, constructing dikes or ponds on flood-prone areas, establishing permanent waterways, riparian zone revegetation, erosion control dikes and drop spillways.

Interested landowners should contact the Oregon County OSC office for full information concerning plans in progress and eligibility of applicants.

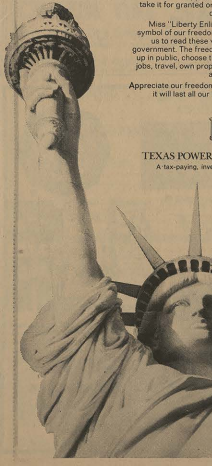
