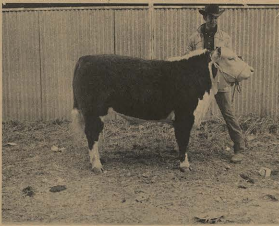
Heard of one fisherman who has been losing minnows by the bunches, and not to larger fish, either.

Come next morning and raccoon tracks near the bucket explained the absence of minnows. Bill punched holes in the lid after several losses to the creature, and tied the lid.

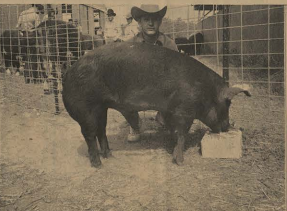

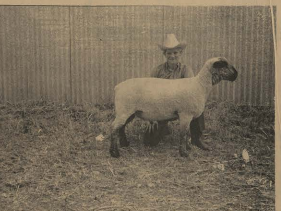

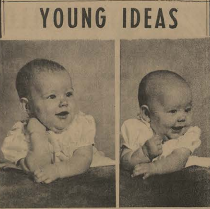
