For the graduates, it is a season of happiness. To be more practical, it is a season of uncertainty. To the nation it is a season of speculation as to what direction the graduates will direct their learning. Either they can use their eventual influence toward restoring the America of which they have heard so much, or they can use it toward further destroying it.

The theory that all National Ills can be corrected by government spending and directives from bureaus created by politics and financed by funds from the taxpayers' pocket-books look over established democratic ways ago. From their classrooms they have read that America is a land of the free. From their contacts with national facts they have observed that what text books have taught them is one thing and what is the current trend is quite another.

The graduate of today faces a confusing world. It is a world still witnessing war.

Domestically, the nation's economy is being threatened and controlled by a minority.

The picture looks bleak, but this country has never yet turned out classes of graduates who did not find their niche in the world, and so will today's. The Ills that are America's today can be corrected, but the corrections rest with sticking to established democratic principles. To follow this course the graduate will face pressure groups bent upon personal gain without regard for national welfare. On all sides today are the examples of what results from disregarding established ways. Upon the graduates rest in part, the responsibility of restoring and preserving the kind of nation they have learned was intended by our constitution. America is still a land of opportunity, but there are different kinds of opportunities — those that build and those that destroy. The choice is up to the graduates. They have been educated to know the difference.

Local School Evaluation Program Slated

Hegon X Education Service Center will sponsor a long-range comprehensive study of Howe school system beginning soon, administrators have announced. The study will take approximately six weeks of data gathering. Cost of the study to the school district will include only those things related to printing the results of the study, or around \$150.

The study will be thorough in scope and comprehensive in nature. It will be concerned primarily with the following components of the total school program operation:

The community setting; pupil population; building facilities; educational program and related activities; personnel; organization and administration; finance; public relations. It will be designed to focus upon the following factors and conditions:

A study of the local community from the standpoint of population growth and economic development as it affects school program needs now and for the next ten years.

An analysis of pupil population trends for the past 5 years and a ten year forecast of student population growth.

An evaluation of existing school plants and sites with respect to their adequacy and condition, capacity and utilization, their possible modernization requirements, and proper location and site for future use.

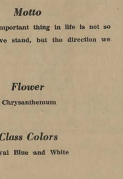
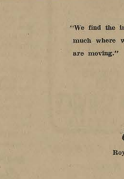
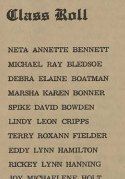

Control Due For

Not Casebearer

Now is the time to control the penicillin casebearer in Grayson County, according to County Agricultural Agent Stanley Oakley.

Originating from the hatch-out of pupae of the penicillin casebearer, indications are that May 20 is the best time to apply insecticides to penicillin casebearer.

The insecticides that can be used for the control of these casebearers are Guthion, Dieldrin, Malathion, and Triphenyltin.

To determine the need for a second application of spray, wait for one day. If spraying continues for four or five days after the first application, a second should be applied 10 to 15 days later.

Consumers Want to Know
Does trash have to be sorted from garbage to be recycled? At the present time, yes. To encourage and assist the volunteer efforts to separate glass containers by color, to use tin cans and metal rings. Substitute metal waste, such as TV dinner trays and aluminum cans in one bag, steel or tinplate in another, plastic in a third and another container. Containers must be washed and flattened.

Does the word "aluminum" on the top mean the whole can is aluminum?
No. Only those that read all-aluminum. Usually all beverage cans use aluminum foil to provide the tear-out feature.

How can you identify an aluminum can?
All-aluminum beverage cans have rounded bottoms with separate bottoms on one side. They are lightweight and easily crushed by your hand.

How can you tell a tin can from a metal can?
Steel or tin-plated cans have seams on two sides, identical to a seam on one side. The easiest way to flatten a can is to remove both ends of the can, then step on it.

Why are some people allergic to nylon hose, get on your nylon sweater and under wear?
Nylon is non-allergic. However, some people are allergic to dyes, stockings, shoes, which are laundered before wearing and this should reduce their allergic reaction. Some people complain that their feet burn when they wear nylon hose. Usually this is caused by the dye, not the material. The feet itching may be too short, or perhaps more cushioning is needed in the sole of the shoe.
