TELEPHONE RATE REQUEST DENIED

Request by General Telephone Company for a rate increase here was turned down by City Council last Thursday night. In the motion to deny the request, council agreed to reconsider the increase in 90 days to determine if service has been improved.

Proposal for the new rates had been presented to city officials at a prior meeting, with last week's special meeting called for consideration of the request. Poor service by council members for mixing the hike.

Mayor Lloyd Butts told representatives of General that he had made a personal survey on service, not mentioning the rate increase, and "I received the same" general complaints.

Garnett Kiestley, district manager for the company, said the request was similar to the low rate of return on local investment, which is a round \$50,000. Return listed by the company was slightly more than 3 per cent, with the percentage raised to more than 5 percent under the proposal. Request would increase private phone bills by \$1.00 per month, from \$7.75 to \$8.75 per month. Extension would remain at \$125. Business increase would be \$2.75; from \$12.00 to \$14.75, with no change for extensions. Rural residence cost would increase to \$8.75 from \$5.50 (four party), and rural business from \$10.00 to \$14.75.

Kiestly said the company had doubled the number of circuits to Sherman within recent months and said the company would bring service up to acceptable levels, if

"unsatisfactory service will be reported to our business office so that we know about them." Several persons speaking of poor service admitted they hadn't reported the trouble to the company.

Howe Basketball Schedule For '72

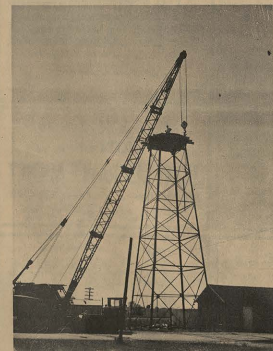
