Free school lunch program explained

Howe school district this week announced a free and reduced price lunch policy for school children unable to pay the full price. Local school officials have adopted the following family size and income scale to assist them in determining eligibility.

For each additional family member, add \$480 per year to the income level.

Families falling within these scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for free or reduced price lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in application forms sent in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school.

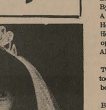
The Rev. Charles Taylor, minister of the church, read the double ring prayer.

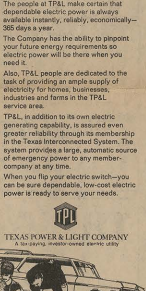

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Missing Letter
There is something missing about the envelope that you received in the mail. Whether you are an insured person or not, meeting a lawyer is the best thing you can do for your future. "Well, that's all right, but..."

But what if the other party, perhaps weeks or months after the fact, tells you that you never arrived? If it came to a court, how would you stand?

Therefore, the law offers you a helping hand. This is called a "power of attorney." That is, the law allows you to let the law do what you want. You can do this in person, provided you had the correct amount of mental and legal soundness. As an out-of-state citizen:

If a promissory founded on the probability that (your employees) will do their duty. Furthermore, you may get the benefit of the promissory if the letter will not be used only into a mailbox. One court ruling held the promissory to be handed to a mailman (while being the recipient) to be put in a letter dropped into the mailbox. However, there is a limit. The promissory you drafted when a man simply left some mail in an open lobby in a public building, the mailman would eventually pick it up.

Furthermore, like most people, you may not be able to be drafted if there is sufficient evidence against it.

In one case, an embossed check drafted to be mailed as urgent legal notice to the office of the creditors. But in a court hearing, both partners in the business, the witness stand and solemnly swore that the note had never been received.

Then their bookkeeper took the lead and swore the same thing.

This testimony was enough to convince the court that the letter had indeed failed to reach its destination. It was more likely that the court, either that the debtor had neglected to put it in the mail or that the post office had-for some-reason—to do this.

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Social Security

Certain information is necessary to change the address on social security checks according to the Sherman Social Security office.

When you call or write in to change your address, include the following information: name, address, date of birth, sex, marital status, and whether you are a beneficiary of a deceased person's social security benefits. If you are a beneficiary of a deceased person's social security benefits, you must also include the name and address of the deceased person.

GRAYSON — All residents of Grayson County may obtain a freeze on their credit information, according to J. C. Maple, chairman of the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office.

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The Grayson County ASCS office is located at 112 E. Third Street, Sherman, Texas. The office is open from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

"Member will interpreters or guests be made by ASCS county office people. They will answer only those questions for which they have been supplied answers. If they don't know the answer to a specific question, they will say so. If a member of the public wants the county office to obtain an answer, the question must be in writing and sent to the answer. If the district office is in the area, the district office will handle the question. Normal functions of the ASCS district office are to administer farm action programs of the U.S. Department of Agriculture."
