Howe relative killed in auto crash near Groom, Texas

Federal services for Joe Charles Thornton, 30, Groom, Texas, were held recently in the Church of Christ, Groom. He was a grandson of Mr. and Mrs. J. Vinayard of Howe, and a nephew of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Holcomb.

Mr. Thornton died of internal injuries in a Groom hospital after he had been pinned in the wreckage of an automobile for an hour after the 3:30 a.m. accident.

Highway patrolman said Mr. Thornton's pickup truck ran into the rear of a semi-trailer about half a mile east of Groom.

Mr. Thornton was born in Howe, and was a 1960 graduate of Groom High School. He operated a service station in Groom. He was a member of the Groom Church of Christ.

Anna falls to Bulldogs, 21-6; Whitewright here Friday night

Defending regional champions Bulldogs spotted the Anna Coyotes a TD, then hit for three of their own to take the season opener, 21-6 here last Friday night.

The Bulldogs will host the Whitewright Tigers this Friday, beginning at 8 o'clock. The Tigers handled the locals one of their two defeats last season in their march to regional honors.

Anna picked up their lone score in the opening minutes of the first quarter last week, when the Bulldogs, with first game jitters evident, lost a fumble on the Howe 10. The Coyotes Wes Scriber scored from the three on a fourth down effort to give the visitors a short-lived lead.

A newcomer to Howe and the Bulldogs lineup, Donald Pearce, boosted the Bulldog morale late in the first period when the senior fullback broke off left tackle for a 74-yard scoring jump behind personal blocking. Quarterback Steve Allison cleared Pearce through the front line with misleading futility for the benefit of the Coyote defense. Executive point guard was by Steve Underwood, who converted on three attempts during the evening.

Robert Trotter electrified fans moments later with a 75-yard punt return across the double stripes, but the effort didn't count on the scoreboard when a clipping penalty returned the front line to mid-field. The first halfback was

not to be denied, however. From the Anna 37, Trotter hit a clearing around right end for the second Howe TD with nine minutes remaining in the period. Underwood then made it 14-0.

Following three offensive plays on Anna's part, Trotter capped scoring for the evening with a 70-yard punt return with Lemmy Gray eliminating the last Coyote defender from the scene.

Coach Norman Dickley praised the team, which lists only four starters from the 1970 Regional championship team, "for settling down and playing a fine game of football." Dickey added that "All members of the squad showed a lot of effort and desire, and this is what it takes to win a football game. We're proud of them."

Barring practice injuries, starting lineups will remain the same as last week, Dickey concluded.

Committee to air school dress code

A study committee, named by School Board President Dr. Neil Culp, is scheduled to prepare recommendations for a revised dress code later this week as a result of a special meeting Monday night attended by approximately 40 interested citizens. Board members will act on the recommendations offered by the committee, which is made up of representatives of the board, the Student Council, faculty, parents, and churches.

The special meeting was requested by Mr. and Mrs. Dale Mark and Mr. and Mrs. James Howdeshell, after students of the couple were sent home last week for alleged violations of the dress code.

Following opening of the meeting with prayer, a custom of the board, Mark was given the floor to explain his position to the board, noting that his daughter was sent home last Thursday for "improper attire," in the form of a white blouse, and red and white checked pants bearing a soft drink insignia (the Howdeshell girl was also sent home in identical dress, parents said).

"This is a matter of opinion regarding 'proper attire,'" Mark said. "She was neat, and the suit was coordinated as outlined in the policies of the school. I instructed her to return to school as did Mr. and Mrs. Howdeshell regarding their daughter, but they were sent home a second time for the same reason."

Stating that he was in favor of rules, Mark said a vote employed to talk to Principal L. H. Linker at the high school, and, according to Mark, "Mr. Linker said the action had that he personally didn't see anything wrong with the attire but he had to back the teachers. In my opinion, no one there has any authority there except this teacher."

Mark said he had requested the special meeting, but then was never notified of when it was to be held (it had to be a board member), he continued. This was brought out by other speakers on several occasions, including an all-around lack of communication between the school and parents.

Mark continued that he took his daughter, dressed in the questioned attire "to some individual board members and administrators," and they all said it looked all right to them. We tried to get her back in school, but could find no one to administer. Who has the authority?"

Other individual cases were cited by visitors.

In answer to the author of the dress code, visitors were told that it was a joint effort by members of the board, faculty and administrators, approved by the board with instructions to principals to enforce it.

Speaking individually, board member Ray Beeson stated that "I am as responsive as anyone else for these codes. We spent many hours on this, and someone has to enforce them and this fell on the administrator who are being paid by you, the taxpayer, if anyone can come up with a solution to this problem, I'm all for it, but we have to draw all for it, but we have to draw matter what rules you set, there will be some operators make a test case. Asking information concerning board meetings, visitors were informed that the board meets in regular session monthly in the administration building the first Monday of each month, with the meetings open to interested citizens.

Motion to appoint the study committee was made by J. L. Davis. The committee is scheduled to convene "as soon as possible."

County receives funds for jobs

Grayson County has received \$92,000 for salaries for the unemployed who will be put into jobs under the Emergency Employment Act, according to Jerry Chapman, executive director of the Texas Regional Planning Commission.

Chapman, appearing before the Grayson County Commission Tuesday, said that applications for jobs should be made through the Texas Employment Commission. He said that provisions have been set up for hiring personnel in jobs created by units of local government.

He said that under the act veterans will be given first priority. The court appointed Chapman and Paul Lee, county clerk, to act as agents to administer the funds. The money has been put in a depository. Weldon Williams, chairman, explained that this was necessary because the money is not to be mixed with county funds.

The purpose of the grant is to reduce unemployment, Chapman said.

Chapman, acting as representative of the TRPC, has charge of the same funds for Cooke and Fannin counties. He said that the jobs will be through governmental agencies. The money will be used to help in providing a new job source but it will be up to the same unit to provide a program on after (Continued on page two)

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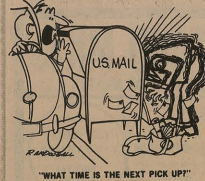

Postmaster James Davis announcing a new mail service program recently announced by Washington headquarters, today identified local areas which are to receive overnight delivery of its coded "first-class mail" originating within the Howe area.

Postmaster James Davis said six areas contiguous to Howe will benefit from the program. Deliveries under a new mail service paid annual fee by Washington headquarters.

These areas, Postmaster James Davis said, include the following: The cities of Dallas and Fort Worth and the surrounding areas; McKinney, Richardson, Fort Worth, Denton, Greenville and Sherman, Texas.

Postmaster General Blount on August 10 advised that the Postal Service's new plan of overnight delivery of local first-class mail designated by "3" p.m.

"The Postmaster General has indicated that this program will affect "more than half" of all "first-class letter mail" sent in the United States "on customers of overnight post office in the country will benefit from the new service plan."

Postmaster James Davis said that the \$2 billion piece of first-class mail handled annually is to be delivered in the city where deposited or in nearby communities.

The areas outlined today by Postmaster Davis are those within which everyday delivery will be provided for ZIP CODED 3-Digit mail, on weekdays in business areas, and at collection points on main thoroughfares.
