## RECORD CITY BUDGET ADOPTED

Budget for fiscal year 1971-72 for the general and operating fund and the sanitation department was adopted by City Council at regular monthly meeting last Thursday. Tabular for further consideration was the Police Department budget, with a proposal of \$10,900 expenditures.

Total income for the year from taxes, garbage fees, fines, water, sewer, etc. (complete budget may be found on page four) was listed at \$102,200, with expenses, including the proposed police budget, at \$90,510.50. Council voted to set tax rate at the same \$1.50 per \$100 valuation, based on 30 per cent actual value, but changed the breakdown on tax revenue to allocate 90 per cent to the general fund, four per cent to the sinking fund, and six per cent to the Rattan fund. Breakdown last year was 80 per cent general fund, 1 per cent to the sinking fund and eight per cent Rattan.

In other action, council created a Police Department, estimating the City Marshall's position —

Turned down a request for location of a mobile home in the south part of town near the end of Hughes street —

Turned down a request by a property owner for the city to issue him a deed for an alley adjoining his property. Although this has been done on occasion in the past, request was denied due to possible use by garbage truck in the future —

Refused to accept streets which were laid with rock as requested by a builder near Tom Bean road, due to city specifications on streets dedicated to the city —

The couple has been in Galveston for the past two months. Their request has been approved for a federal grant which will be used to buy a kidney machine. It will cost \$200 per month to keep the machine operating.

Powell, resident in Sallis, was discharged from the U.S. Army in 1950.

### Sales barn planned at Tom Bean
