GREENHILL DUMPS HOWE, 20-14; DISTRICT PLAY STARTS FRIDAY

District play will open here Friday night when the Howe Bulldogs entertain Prosper's Eagles in the first of a four-game race for the crown.

Game time is advanced to 7:30 p.m. for all district contests.

Head Coach Norman Dickie said this week that the squad is ready for the Prosper game physically, despite a pair of injuries in the 20-14 loss to Greenhill last week.

Robert Trotter, halfback, lost two teeth and will possibly lose two more as a result of his injuries. Steve Underwood received a knee injury, but both will be on the starting lineup Friday, Dickie said. Howe's defensive ground game held the Greenhill team to 185 yards, but the visitors did a repeat against the pass defense on three occasions to chalk up three easy scores, we final one to regain the lead with less than two minutes to play.

Greenhill took an early 6-0 lead after covering their own kick at midfield, scoring in four plays, with a 34-yard aerial accounting for the marker.

The Bulldogs pushed on 4th down after their first three plays, recovering the pigskin via a fumble on the Hornet line to set up their initial TD.

Donald Pearce, fullback, hit for two yards and the score on third down. Extra point attempt was missed, to knot the game at 6-6.

Greenhill penetrated to the How 14 yard line in the second period, but had to give up the football on downs.

The Bulldogs went ahead 8-6 after punting to the Hornet two-yard line, then downing a Greenhill back in the end zone for the safety.

Lenny Gray intercepted a Hornet aerial to open third

quarter action, and set up the second How TD at the Hornet 30. Pearce hit the right side for 12 yards then Robert Trotter covered the final 15 on a third down effort to place Howe in the lead 14-6.

Greenhill pulled a repeat of their first scoring pass play later in the third period from the How 41. The aerial was a fourth down effort. Try for two extra points failed, with the Bulldogs still sporting a 14-12 lead.

The Hornets' winning TD climaxed an effort that began on their own 27 following a How punt. Distance was covered like this: three yard run; 25 yard How penalty; 12 yds on the ground in three plays; 10 yards in three plays; 15 yd Greenhill penalty; three successful aerials for 8, 10 and 12 yards; five yard Greenhill penalty; 11 yard (half the distance) How penalty to the Bulldogs 11; pass for TD with 2:18 left on the scoreboard clock.

HOWE STATE BANK SOLD TO COUNTY MEN

A group of farmers, ranchers and businessmen agreed this past weekend to purchase the majority of the stock of the Howe State Bank, How, Tex. from A.L. Geer and a group of associates at an undisclosed price. Transfer of the stock ownership is to take place within 30 days subject to the approval of the Texas State Banking Department and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

The purchasers are headed by Joe P. Wallace, a veteran of Bank management in Texas, Tennessee and a former National Bank Examiner. Wallace is a native of Grayson County and is joined by his brother, Roy Wallace and Lawrence Hedges (O.G. USA Ret) of Gutter, Jerry Harlan Sherman and George Light and Bob Light of the Ethel Collins village Community.

Present directors of the Howe State Bank adding to their holdings and included in the majority group are N.R. Langford, Joe C. King, Jack Norman and Charles R. Thompson of Howe. G.C. Jones, Marshall Robertson and Ray Houston of Howe will continue to serve on the Board of Directors and no changes in Bank management or other board changes were announced.

Wallace stated, "I feel that this action will strengthen the competitive position of the Howe State Bank by broadening its adjacent trade territory. It will be a truly locally owned and operated institution for the benefit of the people in the local area. My family and I are looking forward to living in Howe and taking an interest in the bank and an active role in civic activities." My associates and I have utmost confidence in the economic future of the area and welcome to the opportunity to contribute to its growth and prosperity."

City receives commission go ahead for federal grant — water supply

The Motorola Corp. submitted the apparent low bid for a three-county law enforcement radio communication system at the Monday night meeting of the Texoma Regional Planning Commission.

B. V. Hammond Jr. of Denison, commission president, presided at the first meeting of the body held in new quarters at Sam Rayburn Airport. The commission formerly was based at Grayson County College.

The commission voted the City of Howe a go-ahead on its application for a federal grant and loan for expansion of its domestic water supply.

T. A. Reid, a Freese, Nichols & Endress engineer from Fort Worth, said Howe could follow either of two routes. One called for an additional well that would cost \$175,000 if drilled into the Woodbine sand, or \$207,000 if drilled into the Trinity. The other option would be a surface lake, using the Crook Creek dam site, at an estimated cost of \$530,000. Reid said the well was the more feasible on the basis of economy.

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year had been received from Housing and Urban Development in the amount of \$80,000 and the State of Texas, \$150,000. President Hammond approved as a budget committee. The city managers of the four larger area towns, Larry Krum, Sherman, chairman, James Farmer, Denison, Jimmy Dotson, Galvestone, and Dan Mize, Bonham. The resignation of Ben Blackwood, former manager of Texoma Industries, as a member of the commission was approved. Blackwood resigned after being transferred to a new post. The council authorized a resolution of appreciation. Chapman reviewed a ruling by the state attorney general that limits commission members to elected political officials, county, city, and school. The Chamber of Commerce members of the panel may continue as associate members, serving in an advisory capacity. These include Worth Campbell of Denison and Dr. Harry Spivey of Sherman, both one of the founders of the commission. Hammond expressed regret on the loss of the active participation of these members and expressed the hope that they could continue as associate members. He appointed a committee to draft the necessary by-laws revisions, including the three judges, Les Tribble of Grayson, Charles Moore of Fannin, and Harry Sullivan of Cooke.

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TP&L completes generator at Savoy

The generating station is located on Valley No. 3 transmission line near the Farmington and Grayson County line. A 120,000-amp line is located on the property to provide cooling water for the steam turbine condensers.

Construction of the new unit is part of TP&L's efforts to provide ample electricity to the future demands of the company's Northwest Carolina production in the Blue Ridge Country.

The new unit will help furnish 200,000 kilowatts of electric power for the future needs of the area and the Red River Valley area served by TP&L.

The United States Court District Court has ruled that TP&L cannot be held liable for its role in the construction of the plant.

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Social Security

The Social Security Administration has recently begun using computers to ship and start monthly social security payments. Computers are not new to social security, but this usage of them is new as compared to the Social Security Administration in Sherman. Before, if a person stopped working after establishing his entitlement to social security checks, it was necessary to send a written notice to the payment center where the records are kept. Now the local social security office can enter the information into the computer system. This system will get the checks out faster.

A written notice was also necessary if a person wanted to stop his checks. Now this information can be entered into the computer system loop.

If you stop or start work, call your local social security office.

Have your social security claim number ready and be prepared to give them an estimate of your expected earnings for the current year.

Time To Revolt Now

STORIES of a taxpayer revolt make good reading for the rebelliously inclined. But, as a practical matter when the spending level of government rises, there is no alternative to higher taxes. The time to protest is before the spending starts. For example, it is now generally conceded that extensive changes are to be made in the nation's health care system—how costly these changes will be depends upon how deeply the government enters the health care picture.

A spokesman for the Nixon administration has warned that a federally-funded national health insurance program would triple the average American's tax bill for federal health services and still add \$11 billion to the government's budget deficit. It would mean that the taxes required to pay for such services for all average families would rise to \$1,271 a year from the present \$495, according to the spokesman.

This is the estimated price of an all-governor health care program now being proposed in Congress. Other less costly health insurance programs are also being advocated. One of them, offered by the medical profession would finance care needs through a system of tax credits while retaining the principal features of the traditional American medical system which have led to the highest quality of health care ever known. The medical profession's proposal, known as Medicare would make tax credits of private citizens and would preserve the principles of voluntarism and free choice, both for doctor and patient.

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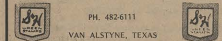

OUTDOORS IN TEXAS BY VERN SANDRO

Waterfowl stalking is rarely done today.

It is rare for two reasons: first, because you use decoys to make the ducks come to you...

Still it's a very exciting and different way of hunting ducks and geese. It's not clear, so you're fast. Stalking doesn't mean sneaking up on birds and raising them from the water...

If you're interested in making a waterfowl stalk, here's how it's done. Weather and terrain are the keys factors involved. It can best be done on a day when visibility is low...

As for terrain, it can be done only where marsh and rice vegetation is high. The cover must be tall enough so that you'll be well hidden while you're walking, leaning over...

The stalk must be made from one side. First, the wind will carry any noises you may make into the water. Second, like airplanes, waterfowl must take off against the wind...

A goose stalk is harder than one for ducks. This because geese are on the ground and there's always a "watch" gander around eyeing all the ducks. Most ducks, however, are notorious about not keeping a watch on their rear.

A goose stalk is most successful when the hunt is made in pairs. One hunter will make himself plainly seen ahead of the birds in order to hold their attention. They won't fly as long as he stays several hundred yards ahead of them...

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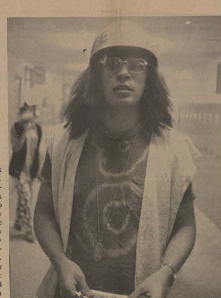
