A few thoughts about a couple of wronged women, God bless 'em.....

The U. S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals recently ruled that "there is a compelling public interest in not having pregnant female soldiers in the military establishment."

The court ruling was in the case of Capt. Susan Struck, "the first U. S. Air Force officer to give birth to a child while on active duty."

That sounds as if the Captain delivered her baby while dropping bombs on Laos. Which could hardly be the truth. I'm sure she went back to the barracks for the occasion and was probably even late for reveille next morning.

Anyway, the court decision means "OK for the Air Force to discharge Capt Struck simply because she got pregnant. That's not fair.

I've known male soldiers who were AWOL nine months and weren't discharged. They were slightly incarcerated for a few months, an demoted; but they kept their jobs.

And I remember several men sergeants who often suffered from a morning sickness you wouldn't believe. A week out in town would render them useless to the war effort until Wednesday, at least. But they weren't discharged. They were put in charge of the recruits until all where they asked everyone out until they had slept their way back to health.

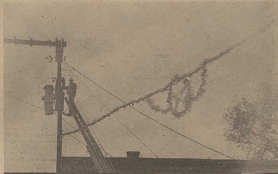
And then, of course, there's the ultimate question: By what was Capt. Struck imprisoned? If the father was a fellow airman, was he discharged? Certainly not. He probably got a medal for making a beyond-duty effort to improve fellowship at the Officers' Club.

Obviously, there is no decent reason why a female soldier should be granted maternity leave for, say, a month? Then it could be back to duty. It is the same as a male soldier returning from R&R in Hawaii.

Also, something should be done for female jockeys. A gross injustice was recently revealed in the case of John Bahr and his wife, Mary. Both are jockeys. Both wanted to race at the Hazel Park Race Course. But the track stewards ruled it was "against policy" to allow husband and wife to compete in the same race. This regulation is enforced at all tracks. It is feared the public would distrust the result of any race in which spouses were pitted against each other.

But get this: Brothers are allowed to race against each other and sons are allowed to race against their fathers. It happens fairly often.

The implication is clear. Two male jockeys can be pitted to race against each other, even if they are Siamese twins. But bring a female jockey into the family (continued on page 2)

Science lab, library, to be upgraded

Howe High school science lab and library are slated for upgrading following a vote by trustees Monday night in regular session.

The board approved a motion to make application for government funds available through Title II and Title III programs.

According to Supt. Charles Thompson, the local system is eligible for more than \$800 under one program, based on expenditures by the local system over the past three years, and a \$672.00 grant which will be matched with local funds.

In lengthy discussion, with no official action taken, board members turned down an architect's proposal for a building expansion program at the elementary building, and agreed to look into feasibility of "looking only to next year's needs instead of ten years in the future." Cost estimate is to be obtained on two additional rooms and two restrooms at the school. First grade head count at the beginning of the 1971-72 term necessitated use of one room for two grades. Large first grade enrollment is also expected next fall.

Possibility of switching the junior high and elementary

students from one building to the other was also discussed. Changeover would require considerable expense in plumbing, and symposium accessibility would be lost by Junior High students, board decided.

City income and expenses listed

Tax collections boosted the City of Howe's November income above expenses, monthly financial report shows. Total income from taxes listed at \$2,495.10, with water revenue leading the column with \$5,038.65. Other resources include: sanitation department, \$994; permits, \$23.50; police department, \$64.50, and driveway work, \$306.

Expenditures include \$736.31 from the general fund; \$1,971.77 from the operating fund; \$100, sanitation department, and \$2,917.60 salaries.

Bank balances show \$14,308.62 in the general and \$15,276.62 in the operating fund, with \$565.39 listed for the sanitation department. Savings accounts are: Rattan, \$15,886.01, and sinking, \$11,758.00.

Makeup council meeting rescheduled for Tuesday night, saw no official action taken due to lack of a quorum. Regular meeting, slated for Tuesday last week, was canceled due to weather.

DORCHESTER—A water engineer for the city council here said it would be a prudent way for the city to get the water system set up by the end of 1971 to implement the state's new water system. The cost of the system has been estimated at \$173,000 and will be paid by the state and the city.

The engineer said that water bills under the new system would start at \$5 per month. It was announced that the city will purchase the equipment and present independent water supply to the city by 1972.

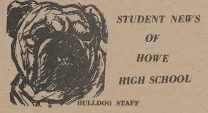
