

New housing development discussed in council meeting

Jim Harvey of the Harvey Group spoke to the Board of Howe about a future intended development by SPM Partners, Ltd. He was at the meeting representing the owner of the property.

The reason for the meeting was an attempt to gain a variance for road residential one-acre lot subdivision to chip and seal streets instead of concrete streets. Chip and seal was proposed to meet Grayson County specifications. The location of the development is proposed near the old Summit township location on the north side of eastbound FM 902 before reaching Bennet Road. The property is located outside is inside the Howe extraterritorial jurisdiction (ETJ).

The original plan was taken before the Howe City Council in 2002 and was never filed through the city the tracts were never



developed.

Harvey told the council that the developer is now wanting to develop the property very similar to the original 2002 plan.

"What we're requesting is to meet all county codes and do the chip and seal rather than the contrete." said Harvey. "There's no sewer out there. It's all going to be septic. By allowing chip

Traditionally, when Howe starts meeting East Texas teams in the high school football playoffs, the end begins to be clear in sight. But the type of game this Howe Bulldogs (9-3) team plays stymies most of the advantage that another team may have athletically. Howe's slot-T offense is designed to create long sustaining drives that keeps the ball out of the hands of the opponent. That has helped the Bulldogs win 24 of the last 31 games in which five of those are playoff wins. On Friday, it that took 9:54 off of the clock that spelled the final doom for Howe's opponent Jefferson (9-3), the winner of District 8-3A.

Jefferson had won nine games in a row and were averaging 38 points per game. They are a team that faced a slot-T style offense many times this season due to district foes going to the running style. However, no the Howe Bulldogs do. Jefferson only ran 42 plays

compared to Howe's 72. Howe also held the ball for 32:31 of the total 48 minutes of the game giving Jefferson only 15:29. That type of ball control has forced opponents of Howe to skew way off of their game plan and panic to try and score points quickly knowing that they may not get the ball back until the next quarter. This came true Friday night when Jefferson, trailing 17-7 early in the third quarter, quickly ended a drive with three incomplete passes and taking only:47 seconds off of the clock. They gave was a 17-play, 81-yard drive Howe the ball with 7:15 left in the third quarter and didn't get it back until nearly three minutes were gone in the fourth quarter, now trailing 24-7. That backbreaking 17-play drive virtually eliminated Jefferson from any hopes of advancing to the next round of the playoffs.

The win didn't come without a price to pay as Howe's leading rusher Jaden one hawks the ball quite like Matthews went down with a

and seal, we'll be able to provide custom homes somewhere in the \$250 (thousand) to \$300 (thousand) range. With concrete streets, it makes it unaffordable to the developer. It's just too expensive."

Harvey told the council that within a two-mile radius of the property, there are no concrete streets and that everything is chip and seal including Cedar Hill.

"I've sold many houses in that division (Cedar Hill) for \$250 (thousand) and above." said Harvey.

Harvey says the homes will be quality custom homes with 70 percent brick. He said that most likely local builders will be building the houses.

"We're not going for track builders." said Harvey. "And we're going to be buying Howe water. This is not something they just want to get approved and just sit on it. They're ready to start moving dirt."

There is a question of whether the water will actually come from Howe or Luella, but those issues

will be worked out later in the process.

Joe Gray, a representative of the Gray Family Trust, which owns land adjacent to the proposed development, had questions regarding the grading for water runoff onto the property. Gray also asked to would be responsible for maintaining the chip and seal and if the land would be annexed by the city. Harvey explained that initially the developer would maintain the roads until it is 70 percent full in which they would like to then dedicate the roads to the county. City Administrator Joe Shephard interjected and said that if Howe is supplying the division with water, it is required by ordinance that it be annexed into the city, which would make them city streets.

Typically, a chip and seal street will last about 10 years depending on a number of things including the quality and the natural dirt in Howe.

"We'll garner some tax revenue and water sales revenue to maintain the streets out there." said Shephard.

Howe, who loves to play defense first in the game, lost the coin-toss and found themselves with the ball first for the second straight week. And for the second straight week, Howe had to punt to begin the game. The Dogs showed no indication that they could be stopped on offense as they marched through defenders, but a chop block on a 4th down conversion run forced the punt. Howe's "Black Plague" defense also forced Jefferson to punt which Hines who came floating by. gave the Bulldogs the ball at their own 42 yard line. Howe moved quickly down the field until Matthews coughed it up at the Jefferson 19 yard line.

The game saw two consecutive punts until senior Seth Seibold intercepted a Trey Hodge pass to give Howe the ball at the Howe 42 yard line. Nine plays later Howe kicked down the door for the game's first point with a 2-yard touchdown by Tyler Grisham. That ended a 9-play, 58-yard drive that took 3:58 from the clock and Howe led 7-0 after Brice Honaker's pass to the 12-yard line to Ty PAT kick with 7:38 remaining in the second quarter.

Jefferson immediately responded with a 5-play, 48 yard drive that ended on a 24-yard quarterback

Hodge. Matthews was injured on the play and Jefferson tied the game at 7 with 5:29 left before the half.

With Matthews out, it was Griffin who stepped in his place and immediately showed his speed by racing the 75 yards needed on the first play from scrimmage. After the PAT, Howe led 14-7 with 5:17 on the clock.

After a Honaker pooch kick and a nice return by Jefferson, they began the series at the Howe 48. Quickly moving down the field to the 22 yard line, they called for a hook-and-lateral. Hodge completed the pass to his favorite receiver T.Q. Jackson who pitched it back to running back Damian However, Jackson made a bad pitch and the ball fell on the turf where the Bulldogs recovered it at their own 15 yard line.

With 2:20 on the clock, Howe drove the field and were racing the clock for points. This year's starting quarterback Brandon Wall was injured against Callisburg and has been replaced sophomore Mason Riggs, who has done a stellar job manning the ship. Wall, who suited up for the first time in several weeks came into the game as a slot back and threw a halfback Harvey who won a jump-ball and was knocked out of bounds with 1.1 seconds left on the clock. Honaker was asked to bang through a 30-yard field goal and he responded by splitting the uprights

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37,406 items checked out of Howe Community Library

Howe Community Library
Director Melissa Atchison gave a
fiscal year-end recap of the activity
that took place as well as
recognized some volunteers and
students that accomplished
achievements. Sandra Nitchman
received first place in the Summer
Reading Contest with 83 chapter
books read. Her sister, Janna
Nitchman came in a close second
with 78. First place came with a
\$25 gift card to Cinemark Theaters
and second place came with \$15
candy cart bucks.

The library fiscal year is Sept. 1 - Aug 31 and the total circulation of books during that time was 29,268. In addition to that, 2,022 eBooks were checked out along with 97 audiobooks. 2,014 videos were checked out to give a grand total of 37,406 items for the year.

The school budget, which includes databases, copiers, magazines, books, eBooks, supplies and computers came to \$22,400. The Grayson County money received was \$2,000 which was spent on

books and videos for the community portion of the library instead of the school portion.

The library had 664 in attendance at childrens programs throughout the year. Youth totalled 198 while adults were 298. These programs included Wee Readers, Garden Club, Summer Reading programs, Storytime with Santa, Circus Clown, and Scrapbook Group.

Atchison said the number of volunteers (249) was an incredibly high number for a community the size of Howe. Those volunteers put in 520 hours. These volunteer hours were from projects in the library to working in the garden.

City Patrons that came through the door at the Howe Community
Library totalled 7,762. Nearly 90
new library cards were issued and
2,082 patrons signed on to the
computers at the library. Atchison
explained that some stay on the
computers all day while others just
check their Facebook or print
something and leave.

This week's column will define the gold filled and is not solid gold. various types of gold and the standards to which they adhere.

The karat system is used to reveal the amount of pure gold found in a piece of jewelry. Solid gold jewelry is not actually solid at all. A portion of the gold is mixed with different alloys. Each shade of gold hallmark to determine gold value. uses a different combination of alloys.

- 18K is 18 parts gold (75%) and 6 parts alloy; Europe is marked out? Or give a gift certificate to a 750.
- 10K is 10 parts gold (41.67%) 4. and 14 parts alloy; Europe 417.
- White gold has nickel added to 18K gold.
- Green gold has 25% silver added to 18K gold.
- Red gold has 25% copper added to 18K gold.

If your piece of jewelry is marked 14KGF or 10KGF, that is a common indication that the item is

The marking 14KP or 14KP does not necessarily mean gold plated. It also can stand for 14K gold plumb, which is solid gold. If your piece of jewelry has a P in the marking, be sure to have the gold tested. Technically you should never depend solely on a gold Some people will illegally mark plated gold with 14K gold karat. Texas History Minute:

Barbara Jordan was a woman of many firsts in her career. In her relatively short time in Congress and the Texas State Senate, she left an immeasurable impact and in a cynical and dark age in American politics, she became for many across the nation a voice of conscience.

Jordan was born in Houston in 1936, the youngest of three children. Her father was a respected Baptist minister. The church was a central part of her life in her youth, and she excelled in school. She graduated with honors from the segregated Phillis Wheatley High School in 1952. She could not attend the University of Texas, her first choice, because segregation was still in effect. However, she went to Texas Southern University instead, studying history and political science on her way to becoming a lawyer. She became a champion debater, easily beating contenders from the most prestigious universities in the nation. After graduating with high honors in 1956, she entered Boston University School of Law, gaining a law degree by 1959. After serving as a professor of political science for a year at Tuskegee Institute in Alabama, Jordan returned to Houston to practice law. She dove into politics, but lost two races to the state legislature in the early 1960s. In 1966, she was elected to the State Senate, the first black woman to receive such an honor in Texas. She was widely respected by her colleagues and rose to the position of president pro tem.

In 1972, she was elected to Congress, again the first black woman ever elected from Texas. She sponsored or co-sponsored

years in Congress. Jordan was given a place on the House Judiciary Committee, and the committee undertook the grave task of considering impeachment for President Richard Nixon for his activities during the Watergate scandal. Jordan quickly became a leader in the debate. In one famous speech in 1974, in a steady, careful voice, Jordan expressed her belief in the Constitution and the rule of law over politics. As she said to her colleagues and a nationally televised audience, "My faith in the Constitution is




Nixon resigned before an impeachment vote could be taken, but Jordan became a respected leader across the nation in the process and the reforms that followed. In 1976, she became the first African-American woman to give the keynote address at the Democratic National Convention, an address that was met with thunderous applause. In 1992, she again spoke to the convention, reminding the delegates and the nation of the need for change.

Jordan decline to run for a fourth term in 1978. She returned to Texas and began teaching at the University of Texas. She served as chairman of the U. S. Commission on Immigration Reform for two years under President Bill Clinton. In 1994, she received the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

Jordan remained a beloved figure on the UT campus in her later years. However, her health continued to decline. She died in January 1996 at the age of 59. Some scholars have since listed her speeches as among the best ever spoken by an American politician. In the years since her death, a number of schools and streets have been named in her honor, including in her native Houston. As for the university she could not attend as a youth because of her skin color, the University of Texas has since erected a statue to her on campus.


