Abner wins state for second time at FFA competitions

Seven girls from Howe High School competed on Saturday at Sam Houston State University in Huntsville, Texas in four competitions. One of them was Howe senior Mati Abner, who had already finished as State Champion in Jr. Prepared Public Speaking as a freshman in 2013. She had another state championship in her scopes - this time in Creed Speaking.

Unlike athletic competition, there are no grouped classes, such as 2A and 3A. The state of Texas has 10 overall "areas" and the top two area winners advance and compete in a prelim heat of 10 teams. The top give winners of the two heats advance to finals on Saturday.

A three freshmen team of Molly Wilson, Kacie Morgan and Jenna Honore competed at the state

competition for the first time. They had previously placed first at area competition in Agricultural Advocacy. They finished in Creed and Job Interview. the top 20 against 295 teams Abner previously placed in Texas.

and Kindle Catching competed in Public Relations. After placing second at area, they were a top 10 finalist of 350 teams in state.

Abner, who is a seasoned veteran to state FFA competition, competed in two events, Senior FFA first in both at area. She initially advanced to the top Mikayla Doty, Allie Morgan 10 out of 792 competitors in in 1991 and 1992. Creed Speaking and also advanced to top 10 of 537 competitors in the Job Interview category. The overall result was a sixth place finish for Job

Interview, but a first-in-state finish for Creed Speaking.

Abner joins Brad Turner as the only two Howe High School students to claim two state championships. Turner's was in high-jump

The Lady Bulldogs season is officially in full swing after a weekend tournament in S&S and bringing home the third place trophy.







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Bulldogs start season third place finish in tourney



Bulldogs start the season 2-1 with a third place finish in the S&S Tournament.

In Head Coach Tim Short's third year with Howe, his Bullodgs (2-1) opened the 2016-17 season in the S&S "For the Love of the Game" Tournament over the weekend. Howe lost the opener to Texoma Christian, 56-41, but came back to beat Alvord, 73-35 and Era, 41-24.

The opening game saw Texoma Christian jump out early with a huge 22-7 lead in Howe's first quarter of basketball for the 2016-17 season. The lead was too much for Howe overcome, however the 'Dogs improved with each quarter of the game. Howe lost the second quarter, 17-12, but won the third respectively. Elijah Campbell led Howe in scoring with 16, including four three-pointers. Ty Harvey scored 15 of which 10 came in the final quarter. Brandon Wall scored three while Brent Masters, Ty Hawkins and Clay Marshall each

had two points.

In game two versus Alvord, Howe controlled the game from the outset as the Dogs outscored Alvord, 28-13 in the first, 17-11 in the second, 16-5 in the third, and 10-9 in the fourth. Wall led Howe with 23 points, while Harvey added 22 and Campbell tacked on 17. Hawkins scored six and Marshall added three.

Howe played for third place against Era and came away with the win by playing great defense and not allowing Era double-digits in any quarter. Howe won each quarter, and fourth quarters, 10-7 and 12-10, 13-9, 13-4, 11-9 and 4-2. Campbell led Howe with 18 points while Harvey added 13. Seth Seibold had four while Masters tallied three and Hawkins two.

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
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Expansions of US Highway 75 being planned; Howe has hopes of bridge

The Sherman-Denison Metropolitan Planning Organization's TAC (Technical Advisory Committee) met with IEA (an engineering consulting firm) on Wednesday at the TxDOT office in Sherman to discuss the plans of expansion of US Highway 75 in Grayson County from County Line Bridge in Van Alstyne to the Red River. The biggest effect this would have on Howe would be an additional interchange connecting L.B. Kirby Ave. by the Dollar General to Hall Cemetery Road by Abbington Meadows apartments. According to initial grading scales as well as public input, it appears that the interchange will score high enough to be able to be included in the expansion process, but final decisions have yet to be made. Howe was represented in the meeting by City Administrator Joe Shephard and Economic Development Director Monte Walker.

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The categories of projects are weighted on a percentage scale according to importance. Safety is the number one concern and was given 33.75 percent. Maintenance and System Efficiency was granted 23.75 percent and Congestion and Freight Reliability at 21.25 percent. The three least important areas of grading were Economic Vitality (11.25 percent), Transportation Choices (6.25 percent) and Environmental Sustainability (3.75 percent).

Howe's interchange would score well in the Maintenance and System Efficiency category due to its consistency with Howe's thoroughfare plans and comments made in prior TAC committee discussions.

Grayson County citizens had the opportunity to voice their opinion on future expansion projects through a survey issued throughout September. As expected, the public saw the

highest rated project needed for improvements is the interchange of US Highway 75 and US Highway 82. Much discussion has taken place over the last year regarding options to create an easier flow from one highway to the other and bypassing the multiple red lights that currently hampers traffic flow.

Denison citizens spoke the loudest on the survey as a ramp reversal from US Highway 69 to Texas Highway 91 surveyed a close second of public importance. Denison also scored number three and four on the survey list of projects with a six-lane expansion project and main lane maintenance from US 69 to Texas Highway 91.

Grayson County's public indicated that Howe's Hall Cemetery interchange ranked 15 of the 48 projects listed in the improvement projects. Howe also has a ramp reversal on the project list that would alleviate a safety concern from US Highway 75 exiting southbound into the Bicentennial Park ballfield entrance. That ranked 20 of the 48 projects. There was one vote for an expansion of the Farmington Road interchange at the south entrance to Howe and no public votes for an additional interchange at Cavender Road to Dicken Road.

While Howe is in the beginning stages of single-family housing growth, the need for an additional artery crossing Highway 75 will be more prominent due to schools having to bus students from one side of town to the other. Howe ISD has plans for future campuses to be located on the west side of the highway. Currently, the only accesses to the west side of Howe from the east is through Haning Street, FM 902 and Farmington/Blythe Road. Easy mobility throughout a city is also a large factor on attracting commercial businesses such as Howe's much needed grocer.



The custom of the undecorated Christmas tree is supposed to have begun in Germany in the early 700s. The earliest story relates how British monk and missionary, St. Boniface (born AD 680) was preaching a sermon on the Nativity to a tribe of Germanic Druids outside the town of Geismar. To convince the idolaters that the oak tree was not sacred, the Apostle of Germany felled one on the spot. Toppling it crushed every shrub in its path except for a small fir sapling. Boniface interpreted the fir's survival as a miracle, saying, "Let this tree be called the tree of the Christ Child."

We do know that fir trees, indoors and out, were decorated to commemorate Christmas in Germany by the 16th century. It is widely believed that Martin Luther first added lighted candles to a tree. It is said that the stars twinkling amidst the evergreens on his walk home one evening inspired him.

By the 1700s, the Christbaum, or Christ tree, was a firmly established tradition in Germany. This custom spread to other parts of Western Europe. It was popularized in England by Prince Albert, Queen Victoria's German consort. The claim of the Pennsylvania Germans to have initiated the Christmas tree in America is undisputed today.

Most people collect Christmas ornaments and lights. A little sought-after Christmas collectible is the Christmas tree stand (after all who needs more than one?) Christmas trees have been held up by structures that were as simple as home-carpentered tripods and buckets of coal. But during the 19th century a number of ingenious inventions were patented for

supporting the tree in style. The first American patents for Christmas tree stands were issued in 1876 to two Philadelphians. Abram C. Mott and Hermann Albrecht. Albrecht later patented an improved design, which used a cylindrical socket to receive the tree and an encircling ring to steady it; when the ring was turned, it moved three clamps against the trunk. Like its predecessors, the stand had three feet and looked not unlike the cast iron stands then used for flagpoles —a use that both Mott and Albrecht mentioned in their patents.

Other devices for anchoring included a double-pronged arrangement patented in 1891 by Martin Merk, which bracketed the tree trunk and was fastened against it by a screw nut under the trivet-like base. For collectors, one virtue of Merk's design is that his name and the date of his patent are inscribed on the rim of the base, making it very easy for the stand to be identified.

But not all Christmas tree stands were strictly functional. Among the 20 or more that received patents before the close of the century was one, patented in 1878 by Johannes Eckardt, which featured a spring wound mechanism for revolving the tree, and a music box that played a Christmas tune. And in 1899 an inventor named Alfred Wagner came up with a stand that not only made a tree revolve with an electric motor but also preserved its freshness by keeping its base submerged in water. Shocking!

Texas History Minute:

The year was 1854, and the nation was bitterly divided once again over slavery. Sam Houston, now a U. S. Senator for Texas, was in the middle of the debate, faced with a choice between his political career and the future of the nation.

The vote was on the politically explosive Kansas- Nebraska Act. For years, Congress had walked the delicate tightrope trying to balance the interests between North and South. Increasingly, the slavery question dominated every political argument, and Congress tried to avoid discussing it just as much. But this new legislation reopened the festering wound.

The act, introduced in January 1854, was a cynical political ploy by Sen. Stephen Douglas of Illinois to try to make Chicago the hub of the transcontinental railroad. This meant that all railroads going to the West Coast would be routed through Chicago, meaning a fortune for the city and the state. Other potential hubs included Memphis, Tennessee, and New Orleans, Louisiana, which would include more southerly routes through more populated areas, including Texas.

Douglas initially proposed organizing the entire area from the border of the Indian Territory (present-day Oklahoma) to the border with British Canada into the Nebraska and Kansas Territories. This area was the last unorganized remnant of the Louisiana Purchase, and the 1820 Compromise had forbidden slavery in the area. Douglas called for the compromise's repeal by allowing slavery into the new territories while territorial voters decided the final status of slavery.

The nation had 16 free states and 15 slaves states in 1854 plus five territories that would come in as free states in the future. Texas was the slave state admitted. With no more pro-slavery territories, southerners were increasingly worried about being outnumbered and surrounded. Immediately,

sharp opposition to the bill arose. Southern politicians rallied around it as their last chance to bring a slave state into the union, except Houston. Houston had been a protégé of President Andrew Jackson and was an ardent Unionist. He had fought for the nation in the War of 1812 as a young man, bled for Texas to free it from Mexico and to bring it into the United States, and served Texas proudly as its U. S. Senator and former president.

Houston demanded the 1820 Compromise be upheld and the act rejected. As Houston characterized the choice, "Our children are either to live in after time in enjoyment of peace . . . or the alternative remains for them of anarchy, discord, and civil broil." Houston voted against the demands of Texas and southern politicians – the only southerner to vote against the legislation – and faced bitter criticisms in letters and newspapers across the region.


Houston's conscience was clear, regardless of the consequences. He told his wife that the criticism "falls off me like water off a duck's back."


While Houston was popular with the people of Texas, this was a time before the Seventeenth Amendment and U. S. Senators were still chosen by the state legislatures. Though Houston's term would not expire until 1858, legislators immediately voted not to return Houston to a third term. In 1858, Supreme Court Chief Justice John Hemphill was elected by legislators to replace him.

The Kansas-Nebraska Act passed, it was a disaster. It completely destabilized the sense of compromise that existed between North and South. Kansas would erupt into its own civil war with hundreds dead as pro-slavery and anti-slavery forces fought for control of the territory. As it was, 86 members of the House of Representatives in both of the major parties lost their seats because of their support for the Kansas-Nebraska Act. America now headed headlong into the coming civil war. Houston, however, would not be stopped. In 1859, the people elected him as the state's seventh governor with a landslide 57% of the vote.

The story became another example of Houston's patriotism and legendary integrity. The story was later featured in John F. Kennedy's Pulitzer Prize-winning work Profiles in Courage in 1956. Sometimes integrity is more important than ambition or popularity.



Vaccination for smallpox not requirement

Compulsory vaccination for smallpox as a requirement for entering school in Texas has been lifted by the State Board of Health, Board Chairman Dr. Hampton C. Robinson announced Tuesday.

In its official action, the Board stated: "The Texas State Board of Health has modified the compulsory school immunization law which is to become effective January 1, 1972, where the immunization against smallpox will not be a requirement for school ad-

Under authority granted by the Legislature (an amendment to Senate Bill 27 which amended the Texas Education Code), the State Health Department is allowed to modify. delete or add any of the required immunizations.

The smallpox vaccination was one of up to six immunizations set out in the school immunization program. Students have until January 1, 1972 to begin immunizations against the prescribed diseases. Immunizations then must be completed as soon as medically feasible. The required immunizations now for grade school level youngsters are diphtheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis, rubella and measles. Measles immunization is not required if there is a history of measles illness.
