Injured in fatal auto accident

Hubert Kenneth Long, 38, grandson of Mrs. E. E. Clark of Howe, remained in the All Saints Episcopal Hospital in Fort Worth Monday with injuries received in a one-car accident July 24. Young Long underwent surgery the day of the accident for a fractured spleen and is presently reported in fair condition.

The accident killed one man instantly; one other, Guy Hayes Brooks Jr., 14, died later in John Peter Smith hospital in Fort Worth. Injured were Archie F. Dodson, 55, brother-in-law of Mrs. Dot Jones of Howe, driver of the car, and Norman Constantine, 33. The mishap occurred on rain slick IH35W four miles south of Burlington as the Fort Worth church group was enroute to visit two men injured in a con-

struction accident earlier. According to investigating officers, the auto slammed into a bridge railing and plummeted into a dry creek bed 25 feet below. The accident happened about 12:45 p.m. Saturday, July 24.

Killed in the wreck was Lowell Gray Gilbreath, 53. He was pronounced dead on arrival at Peter Smith Hospital in Fort Worth.

Officers said the auto apparently went out of control, ripped up the bridge approach railings and a post before striking the bridge abutment and falling into the creek bed. The injured were also taken to John Peter Smith hospital. In addition to Long, they included Guy Hayes Brooks, Jr., 14, Archie F. Dodson, 55, driver of the car, and Norman Constantine, 33.

Commissioners set hearing on septic tank regulations in county

Grayson County Commissioners Court has scheduled a public hearing prior to taking action on an order for septic tank control regulations for the county. If controls are adopted by the county the regulations will then be submitted to the Texas Water Quality Board for final approval to fulfill requirements of the Water Quality Act of 1967, as revised. The public hearing will be held Tuesday, August 17 at 1:30 p.m.

The need for septic tank con-

trols in the county has been stressed by the health department and the Grayson County Commissioners court, both of which have taken a stand in favor of septic tank control.

Les Tribble, county judge, said that "the court has been very reluctant to enter into any field that limits the rights of the citizens to construct any type of installation on their own property. However, the commissioners are faced with the fact that agencies, over which there would be no local control, will take over if we don't act

School trustees hold line on tax rate

School board Monday night set the tax rate at last year's figure, set date for a public hearing on the proposed budget for the year, and employed two high school teachers.

Tax rate was set at \$185 per \$100 valuation, the same as this year's rate, despite objections by Region XX student report recommending the district begin another building program by next year. Valuations on property within the district are figured at 45 per cent of actual value.

Public hearing on the proposed budget was set for the regular meeting night, September 6.

Motion to secure a loan from Howe State Bank to pay off current monthly bills and September salaries was approved by the board.

Teachers employed included Mrs. Doris Quinn of Sherman, who will teach Freshman and Sophomore English, and David Wright, to teach biology and science. Board approved a job fee for science students, and approved purchase of approximately \$1200 in laboratory supplies.

In other action, approval was voted to pay expenses for attendance of Coach Raymond Adams at a drug abuse workshop in Midland, and for a three day drug workshop to be held later in Amarillo. Adams has been attending the Midland workshop for three weeks. Instruction on the subject is required in schools this year, board was informed.

Three coaches, Adams, Athletic Director Norman Dickey and Tommy Skipworth were each voted a \$300 annual salary increase, their first in three years.

Progress of installation of larger bleachers on the west side of the athletic field was made by Leon Thornhill, athletic committee chairman. The old bleachers have been moved to the east side and the larger bleachers, purchased second hand at a cost of \$700 are being reconstructed for home fans through the efforts of Booster club members, volunteers and N. R. Langford Construction company. Completion date has been set for three more weeks.

Disruptions included in school policies

DISRUPTIONS POLICY

If the Howe Independent School District intends to maintain a high quality educational system, it cannot allow persons with disruptive intent to endanger the safety of students or school personnel, to damage property, to interfere with the educational process, or to attempt to close the school.

In view of the events which have occurred in our nation recently, it is imperative that all necessary steps be taken to protect students, district personnel and property and our effective educational atmosphere.

Therefore, it must be understood that disorder and disruption of the school process will not be countenanced, and persons attempting such actions will be held

and accountable. Further, if it becomes necessary in our efforts to protect students and to effectively operate the schools, we fully intend to ensure the enforcement of all laws and to seek protection of those laws which would be necessary to release our responsibilities. In the maintenance of a positive educational atmosphere to the special interest of any particular group or organization.

A disruption shall be defined as any attempt by any means to disturb the normal tranquility of the school. This shall include, but is not limited to, including encouraging, participating in a protest demonstration, riot, riot, walkout, or other act of entrance.

Beginning August 26, 1970, the following policies shall be in effect:

1. Dressing, acting, or using materials, handouts, photographic, pictures, films, tapes or other visual or auditory materials such as the post, distribution of or over the premises of any school in the Howe Independent School District without explicit approval of the Principal and/or Superintendent shall be considered a disruption. No person shall enter on any school campus to distribute such materials without explicit permission of the Principal and/or Superintendent, until those materials can be taken.

2. Any student interfering with normal instructional programs, or assisted school activities of the Howe Independent School District by inciting, encouraging, demonstrating, or participating in a general demonstration, disruption, riot, strike, walkout, blockade or otherwise, shall be subject to removal from school by the principal and/or superintendent until those materials can be taken.
3. Any person interfering with the normal instructional programs or associated school activities of the Howe Independent School District by inciting, encouraging, demonstrating, or entering on school premises to incite or participate in a protest, demonstration, disruption, riot, strike, walkout, blockade of entrance, etc., shall, at the discretion of the Board of Trustees have fines levied against him such charges as deemed proper.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Section 4.23 of the Texas Education Code, Chapter 88, Acts of the Regular Session of the 61st Legislature, is hereby amended to read hereafter as follows:

§42.3. **Loitering on School Property.** (a) Any person loitering upon school property for the purpose of having the person in charge that be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$50.00.

(b) School property for the purpose of this act shall include the grounds of any school building and any grounds or buildings used for school sponsored assemblies or activities.

SECTION 2. **Emergency Clause.**

BE IT SO ENACTED.

HB 186 A BILL TO BE ENACTED

An Act prohibiting any person or persons on school property or on public property within five feet of school property, shall know or be in concert with others, including the conduct of classes or other school activities, or any act of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$50.00.

SECTION 2. Definitions.

- (a) "School property" as used herein shall include public schools campuses or school buildings upon which public school is located, and any area or building used by a school for assemblies or activities.
- (b) "Public property" as used herein shall include any street, highway, alley, public park or stadium.
- (c) Conduct which disrupts the educational activities of a school includes:
 - (1) Entention by any means of a means of an assembly which prevents or hinders classroom instruction.
