## Four million road bond issue to be voted Saturday

Qualified voters in the Howe area will have an opportunity Saturday to cast ballots for or against a proposed \$4,000,000 county road bond right-of-way program for the Sherman and Denison area. Balloting will be in the First Baptist Church annex, from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Election Judge A. L. Reeves said.

A county committee for the proposal has stated passage of the issue would increase county taxes by four cents on the \$10 valuation.

But they estimate that the almost \$4 million needed for right-of-way will pave the way for the state and federal governments to contribute almost \$5 million to the construction projects. The federal government's part of this figure is expected to be about 40 per cent.

And, they note, once the county has purchased the right-of-way for the federal and state projects, Highways 75 and 82, half of those expenditures will be refunded to the county by the two governments.

Naturally, the committee says, the Grayson County economy will get a big boost from the influx of almost \$5 million in construction funds throughout the 10- to 15-year period expected to complete the proposed road work.

The committee estimates that a large percentage of that figure will be introduced into the county through wages, purchases and other expenditures.

The industrial proposition is based on the assumption that industry requires or prefers locations on controlled access highways, they note.

And the committee cites that

Grayson County is limited now in both large and small industrial tracts on controlled access highways.

Another related industrial aspect the committee says is that better highways will give employees quicker, easier and safer routes to jobs. This factor will permit them, if they prefer, to live in one part of the county and work in another.

Finally, revenue from a tax collected on every gallon of gasoline sold in Grayson County in other counties in Texas which can provide the right of way, they report.

Howe had a perfect homecoming last week eliminated by a district opening win over Prosper's Eagles by a score of 19-12. Showdown is scheduled this week, however when the Bulldogs meet the 130-cats at Celina for the lead in the district race. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

Highlight of the halftime activities last Friday was the crowning of the 1971 Football Sweetheart, and the election and presentation of "Mr. Touchdown" and "Miss Pep Squad."

Fumble Plague Bulldogs Fumbles played a key role in the football contest, with the Bulldogs losing five fumbles to an early 12-0 lead.

First miscue was lost on the first Howe drive at the Eagle 43 but the "dogs forced a punt in four plays and then moved in for their first TD, covering 43 yards in three plays. TD play was a 40-yard aerial from Quarterback Vincent Hish to Roger Landford.

Steve Underwood booted the extra point with less than six minutes elapsed playing time. Howe scored again less than a minute later when Lenny

Gray picked up a Prosper punt and scampered 55 yards untouched. The Eagles apparently thought the play was dead after a Prosper player touched the ball. Officials' upraised arms indicated the six points would stand.

Prosper's initial score was placed on the board on the first play of the second quarter, via a 53 yard pass and run. Drive started at midfield, and the aerial was on a third and thirteen situation, an obvious passing situation. Attempt for a two-point conversion was short.

Prosper moved even closer to the Howe score late in the second period, scoring from the Howe 34 over right guard to climax a 64 yard drive. Another attempt for a two-point conversion also fell short.

Howe led at halftime, 12-12. Robert Trotter returned an Eagle punt to the Prosper 35 late in the third quarter to set up the final score. Fullback Donald Pearce added the six points from the three after hitting six yards each on two prior plays. Boot for the conversion was unsuccessful.

Prosper recovered the six Howe fumble late in the game and threatened to put a damper on the Homecoming. The Eagles picked up a first down on the Bulldog 19, but lost the ball on downs at the 15.

**THE FAMILY LAWYER**  
 "Turned On" Wedding  
 "I do," solemnly spoken by bride and groom, is usually enough to make a legally valid marriage. But suppose you or both of you are "turned on" either by drugs or alcohol. This may create a situation once described by Illinois by English: "The bride says 'I do' and, that the mind is unwell."  
 Marriage is a contract—a legal kind of a bet, but a legal one nonetheless. The key to a contract is mutual consent. If one of the minds is not competent to make a contract, no contract is possible. If how clear mind the bride? Has she been so "turned on" that she is able to understand the nature of a marriage contract at the moment she says "I do." If he has, the marriage may be null and void.  
 Furthermore, even if one of the parties is not competent at the time of the wedding, the marriage may become valid because of what happens afterward. Take this case:  
 A man married a girl he scarcely knew, at the consent of a restricted drinking party. She was an embezzler, but he pleaded in court that he had been in an alcoholic stupor at the time of the wedding.  
 But the girl pointed out that he had continued to cohabit with her for several days after he had sobered up. Such a situation may be assumed the marriage had been nullified by subsequent consent.

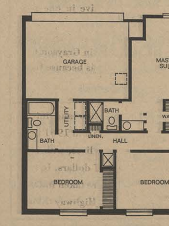
What does a food processor have to do to get government approval as a new food additit? It is very hard for a food processor to get government approval to be sold as a food product unless strict procedures are met.

The new additive must be proven safe for human consumption by a series of laboratory tests. The food processor or manufacturer of the additive is responsible for conducting this test, although in practice, some testing is done by reputable independent laboratories. Testing may take two years or more to complete, and cost thousands of dollars.

Government scientists check and test the results of the tests. In the testing procedure as well, if the results are approved, the manufacturer of the additive will be listed.

Regulations pertaining to additives will be issued in the near future. It is expected to use that the amount to be used is the minimum amount necessary.

\*\*\* WHAT THE BONDS WILL MEAN TO GRAYSON COUNTY \*\*\*

1. \$4,000,000 in Bonds will bring nearly \$75,000,000 highway construction.
2. Large percentage of \$75,000,000 would go into Grayson County economy through wages, materials, purchase, equipment fuel and repairs, and other purchases locally.
3. Industry, in most cases, requires or prefers location on controlled access highways. Grayson County is now limited in both large and small industrial tracts on controlled access highways. Better, safer highways give employees quicker, easier, safer routes to jobs - letting employees live in one part of the county and work in another.
4. Hundreds of thousands of dollars paid in gasoline taxes in Grayson County are going for highway construction in other parts of Texas because Grayson County cannot provide right-of-way.
5. Safer, better highways will not eliminate accidents, but new and improved highways, through better design, can reduce accidents. From 1961 to 1970 auto accidents on Grayson County Highways took 172 lives, with injuries in the hundreds, and property damage in the millions of dollars. In the last three years, 1968, 1969 and 1970, a total of 54 lives were taken in Grayson County highway accidents, not including 11 deaths on Highway 75 within the city limits of Sherman and Denison.
6. It has been fourteen years, since Grayson County voters last voted right-of-way bonds. A highway construction program can not begin, without new bonds for right-of-way. Bonds will be sold only as the program develops, and not more than 7 cents tax per \$100 assessed value would be required in the foreseeable future.

# From Your Capitol

**AUSTIN, Tex.**—A new round voter registration law went into effect for Texas on October 1.

Provisions are that it will make significant changes in the political structure of the state, but also covering the registration of political party conventions and will each operate after year.

These major provisions in the new voter registration act are:

• Voters can register at any time (except for a temporary delay) before each election, registration is good for three years, and is automatically renewed by participation in an election during that period. The old registration period, one of the shortest in the nation, was October 1-January 15.

• Eighteen-to-24-year-olds may register and are eligible to vote in local, state and federal elections under a new S, constitutional amendment.

• Voting or needed registration deadline may be set up by voters where a school, office, union hall, club rooms, dormitories, industrial plants, community buildings, supermarkets or private residences.

This provides that "no voter registrar shall refuse to register a voter." This is expected to increase sharply the use of voters to register to voters. Provisions make upwards of five million total eligible voters in 1972, an increase of a million over 1970.
