The Howe Bulldogs finished their football season recently with a 5-5 record. They were 3-1 in district play.
Coached by Norman Dickert, the Bulldogs can boast that they have not had a losing season for the last 6 years. Coach Dickert led them to district, bi-district, and regional championships and looking at the record for the last six years, the Bulldogs have won 38 games, lost 23 games and tied 1.
Winning more games than losing them is not the only important thing to Coach Dickert, though. in homemaking at Nov. 17 meeting
Debbie Melton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James E. Melton was presented her Junior Homemake Degree and Chapter Homemake Degree at the Future Homemakers of America meeting which featured the Simplicity Fashion Show on November 17, 1971. Debbie is the first one of Mrs Jo Etta Penn's homemaking students to accomplish this goal.
The Degrees of Achievement Program is one way in which the Future Homemakers of America give recognition to its members who: (1) Have worked effectively toward the purposes of the organization, (2) Have contributed to the improvement of their chapters, homes, schools and communities, (3) have made a plan for their own growth as individuals, chapter members, family members and school and community members and (4) have reached their progress as they carried out their plans.
The first two degrees of achievement, the Junior Homemake degree and the Chapter Homemake degree are planned so that members as they work toward the degrees will have a chance to grow step by step in ways that are important to them and to the organization.
Each individual member can decide for herself whether or not she wishes to work toward a degree.
When a member has declared her intention to work toward a degree, has made her plans and carried them out in a way that is helpful to her and to other people, the chapter may give her recognition by conferring on her the degree toward which she has worked.

Vaccination for smallpox not required

Compulsory vaccination for smallpox as a requirement for entering school in Texas has been lifted by the State Board of Health. Board Chairman Dr. Hampton C. Robinson announced Tuesday.
In its official action, the Board stated: "The Texas State Board of Health has modified the compulsory school immunization law which is to become effective January 1, 1972. The Board of Health has decided against smallpox will not be a requirement for school admission."
Under authority granted by the Legislature (an amendment to Senate Bill 27 which amended the Texas Education Code), the State Health Department is allowed to modify, delete or add any of the required immunizations.
The smallpox vaccination was one of up to six immunizations set out in the school immunization program. Students have until January 1, 1972 to begin immunizations against the prescribed diseases. Immunizations then must be completed as soon as medically feasible. The required immunizations now for grade school level youngsters are diphtheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis, rubella and measles. Measles immunization is not required if there is a history of measles illness.

Eight Boy Scouts and their scout leaders headed the cold last Friday night and camped out on the Robert Cooper farm east of Howe. According to the leaders, the temperature dropped several degrees below freezing Friday night.

The scouts built roaring fire and the Hawk patrol fixed a hearty breakfast of bacon and eggs. After breakfast some of the scouts worked on requirements for their special class badges.
Hamburgers were cooked for lunch by the Eagle Patrol. The scouts then broke camp and hiked five miles back home.

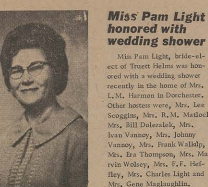
