As she was walking in the bushes and over a stream, she happened to see a wolf. He decided to take a shortcut to the grandmother's house and get the goodies for himself. The wolf killed the grandmother, then dressed in her nightgown and jumped into bed to await the little girl.

When she arrived, he made several nasty suggestions and then tried to grab her. But by this time the child was very frightened and ran screaming from the cottage.

A woodcutter, working nearby, heard his cries and rushed to the rescue. He killed the wolf with his axe, thereby saving Red Riding Hood's life. All the townspeople hurried to the scene and proclaimed the woodcutter a hero.

During the activity, which occurred shortly before 7:30 Tuesday, a tornado struck the southeast part of Sherman, inflicting damage to homes and at the airport. High winds destroyed the hangar at the airport, with tornado sightings also reported in Dallas, Arlington, Duncan-

ville, Grand Prairie, Lewisville, and Geatune. Along with the hangar, three airplanes were reported destroyed in Sherman, which received the brunt of the unusual weather. Other damage included roofs and power lines with service interruption reported at Texas Instruments and in Howe. Only minor damage was reported here.

FDA CHECKS CHRISTMAS TOYS FOR SAFETY

With Christmas near, now would be a good time for parents of young children to be thinking about the safety of toys they are going to buy. Gifts of your own kind of love. It is important that they be chosen with care. It is tragic when a toy, meant to bring happiness, instead injures a child.

Protective children from made toys are one of the responsibilities of the Food and Drug Administration's Bureau of Product Safety. The Child Protection and Toy Safety Act of 1969, which gave more attention in January 1970, empowers the Food and Drug Administration to remove and keep from the market toys and other children's products with electrical, mechanical and chemical hazards. The law is aimed at reducing the estimated 70,000 injuries from toys that occur in and around the home annually.

Refrain from buying toys that are not labeled for children's use. Toys with balloons that can choke a child if gradually taken into the mouth and left in the mouth. Toys and toys containing lead or other toxic substances should not be purchased. Toys for example that have sharp points that can pierce or cut or stand still when playing on mechanical instruments. A spring or ball can cause serious injury or throat injury.

Children with allergies may have reactions to toys such as rubber balls, stork and balloons made with latex with most of the rest of their toys. Toys, such as balloons, stork and balloons, should be made of non-latex materials, identified for use by children, should be less than 1 percent of the total weight.

No toy can protect a child completely from all dangers. With approximately 100 million toys in the country resulting in estimated 70,000 injuries to children each year and approximately 100,000 injuries to children every year, complete assurance of the toy market is impossible.

With limited money and a major market, toys are diverted from other product safety programs to the safety activities. FDA has advised consumers to be alert for signs of approximately 12 types of toys identified as having potential safety hazards. Since December 1970, approximately 600 individual products have been investigated, and more than three toys have been redesigned or production ended.

Protective children from unsafe toys is a general aim of the agency's responsibility. Consideration should be given to the age and size of the child, his ability and the area in which the play will take place. A toy that is safe for one child may be dangerous in the hands of an un-supervised and less-skilled younger brother or sister.

The report in the family should keep those with children under 12 years of age, unless parents notice small, detachable parts that are swallowable, plastic or glass that break easily and have sharp edges that may cut, poorly constructed toys with bright spots or pins that are exposed above the surface, pulled apart to a exposure sharp, toxic and flammable, or other parts attached to a spring or motor that can pull fingers or catch hair.

Chemistry sets, pocket kits, and similar toys should be bought only for children old enough to handle them with a minimum supervision recommended by the manufacturer of the toy should be followed.

Toys that have sharp, though, electric toys such as toys that have sharp points or little parts that are swallowable, should not be purchased for
